SEEN BY QUEEN MOTHER

NINE members of Ealing's Questors were on stage in London on Tuesday night with, among other things, furniture which was insured for £15,000, a silver cup which once belonged to Charles the First, 17th Century Mortlake tapestries loaned from the Victoria and Albert museum, and three copies of The Times of 1890!

The Questors were performing a masque, specially written for them by Angus Acworth, at a reception at the Banqueting Hall at Whitehall, on the occasion of the return of the hall into use as a banqueting hall. It has been a museum for some time.

THE AUDIENCE

The masque, which was in three parts, was watched by the Queen Mother; Nubar Gulbenkian, the multi-millionaire; and many other distinguished guests.

The three parts of the masque were connected with the building, painting and use of the hall. Twenty Questors were involved including backstage people. The masque was produced by Barbara Emmet, known to the Questors as Barbara Hutchins.

The actors concerned were Neville Bradbury, Vincent McQueen, Myles McDowell, John Howard, Dorothy Boyd Taylor, Sylvia Estop, Diana Benn, Michael Langridge and Peter Faintey.
