JEAN - JACQUES BERNARD

was the originator of what has been described as "the theory of silence"—the language of things that cannot be put into words. In his own words, "Drama is, before all else, the art of the unexpressed. It is less through the words that are actually spoken than through the reaction to them that the deepest feelings should be revealed." Bernard's conscious method is one that reveals to the audience the dialogue of thought underlying the dialogue of speech. As in real life, his characters often use speech less to express their feelings than to shield them. He has brought the technique of this method of indirect statement to a fine art, and he uses it with great sensibility. Indeed, it could only be successful in the hands of a sensitive artist with a profound understanding of human nature.

"Martine" is generally acknowledged as Bernard's masterpiece. First produced in 1922 by Gaston Baty, it was, before the present war, in the repertoire of the Comédie Française. It was not until 1929 that the play was first produced in this country, at the Gate Theatre Studio, when it won wide critical acclaim. It is with particular pleasure that we introduce this exquisite little play to our audience.
