## A NOTE ON THE AUTHOR AND THE PLAY

Susanna Centlivre was born about the year 1670. She left home before she was fifteen and became a strolling player. Her first husband, a certain Mr. Carroll, was killed in a duel eighteen months after the marriage; and it was by her second marriage, in 1709, that she was to obtain the name Centlivre. Mr. Joseph Centlivre, one of Her Majesty's cooks, first saw Susanna at Windsor, where she was playing the "breeches" part of Alexander the Great, in 1706. If his own rank was modest, it did not prevent his name living through the industry of his wife, who wrote no fewer than nineteen plays and several powerful political poems.

A Bold Stroke for a Wife was first played at Lincolns Inn Fields on February 3rd, 1718, where it ran six nights (a substantial success in those days). Although it was regarded as a mere farce, not worth serious critical attention, it is nevertheless one of our author's best constructed plays. Moreover, as she claims in her dedication—to his Grace Philip, Duke and Marquis of Wharton, etc.—"All I dare say in favour of this Piece, is, that the Plot is entirely new, and the Incidents wholly owing to my own Invention; not borrowed from our own, or translated from the Works of Any Foreign Poet; so that they have at least the Charm of Novelty to recommend them."
