A NOTE ON "LARRY"

Happy As Larry was first heard in September 1947, when it was presented by Mr. E. Martin Browne's Pilgrim Players at the Mercury Theatre, in a production by Denis Carey. After a long and notably successful run at that tiny theatre it was transferred, in December the same year, to the Criterion Theatre, where it was presented in a slightly different, and longer, version. Mr. MacDonagh had made a very significant contribution to the work of "The Poets' Theatre Guild," whose avowed object was "to bring poetry back to its place in the theatre." His success may perhaps be accounted for by the simple fact that his play sings with delight, as all genuine poetry must, and also holds an audience in a dramatic spell, as all real plays must: these twin necessities of the poetic drama are too seldom realized by that modern cult of writers striving to establish themselves in this very specialized field of dramatic literature.

Despite the simplicity of the plot, there are some few words and phrases that may confound an English audience. The title of the play, for instance, is a common expression meaning, in effect, "happy as a sand-boy," which, in turn, signifies a state of exultation, such as may be attained by imbibing a "Ball of Malt" (a glass of whiskey), followed by "Lunatic Soup" (a strong drink mixture, mainly cider), then, perhaps, a "Johnny Jump-up" (another potent cider). This, we imagine, would render us "half-jarred" (or half drunk), and we would start talking "guff" (senseless, possibly malevolent, talk). It is well to remember that a "Red Biddy" is not to be taken lightly, being an almost lethal dose of cheap red wine, mixed with a generous amount of methylated spirits; and we must not forget that St. Patrick's Day is a day of mourning among the drinking classes, as all the public bars are closed all day: hence "as dry as St. Patrick's Day," when it is impossible even to get a "plain" (or a single X porter, at about eightpence a pint!).

OUR NEXT PRODUCTION

The next production of the season will be a revival of a once famous and popular comedy by the celebrated Mrs. Centlivre. The play is A Bold Stroke For A Wife, and it was first acted at the famous theatre in Licolns Inn Fields in February, 1718. So far as we can discover, our production will be the first in London for about 100 years. Opening night: Saturday, June 12th.
