## A NOTE ON THE AUTHOR AND THE PLAY

Mr. Robertson Davies, author, critic, playwright, and editor of the Peterborough Examiner (Ontario) has a very considerable record of achievement in the world of letters and the theatre. He was educated in Ontario and at Oxford, after which he served an apprenticeship with the Old Vic, both as actor and writer. He had two volumes—Shakespeare for Young Players and Shakespeare's Boy Actors—published before the war, and in the years since 1947 he has had published several further works, including two volumes of The Table Talk of Samuel Marchbanks; a three-act play called Fortune My Foe, which has been successfully televised in Canada: Eros At Breakfast and Other Plays, a collection of five one-act pieces: Tempest Tost, a novel; and further plays, such as A Masque of Aesop; King Phænix, a delightful fantasy about Old King Cole which has been played in Canada; and At My Heart's Core, which has been performed over a hundred times in Canada.

A Jig for the Gipsy was heard on the B.B.C. Welsh Region in 1952, when it was broadcast under its original title, Benoni. At the time when it was decided to include it in our Silver Jubilee season there had been no previous stage production, and the Questors hoped to give the world première performance; an honour which has since gone to the Crest Theatre, Toronto, where the play was produced on September 14th—a mere eleven days before our first night. The author and his wife, having attended the Toronto première, flew from Montreal on B.O.A.C. Monarch service on September 22nd in order to be present at our opening performance. It must be a rare experience for any author to witness two completely different treatments of his play within so short a space of time. In extending a warm welcome to Mr. Davies and his wife, we take this opportunity of saying how much we hope their journey will be made worthwhile by their visit to the first night of our Silver Jubilee season of new plays.

### OUR NEXT PRODUCTION

The second production of the Silver Jubilee programme is to be the world première of Better A Dead Hero . . .? by Ray Rigby. Set against the sordid, yet colourful, background of war-time Cairo, city of bars and night clubs, soldiers on leave and cabaret girls, this play depicts the gripping story of a soldier and cabaret girl whose love is swamped amid the grim realities of war, and the search after the conflict for that love which once flourished. First performance: Saturday. November 13th: Box Office opens November 3rd.
