Kenneth Tynan once remarked that only three subjects presented themselves to the dramatist as worthy of study—sex, politics and religion. Lydia Ragosin confidently adds a fourth, all-embracing subject to the list—war.

In *The English Captain* she takes us back to the Spanish Peninsular War and with a bold brush illustrates her main theme: the simultaneously destructive and ennobling effect of war on the human personality.

The English Captain was broadcast by the B.B.C. in November, 1954. The present production is, however, its first stage presentation, and it is hoped that the play will be entered for the Charles Henry Foyle New Play Award for 1955.

Other notable plays by Lydia Ragosin include *Tinsel of Athens*, first produced by the Questors in 1950; *Order of Chivalry*, broadcast in 1954; and *October Horizon*, which was televised in 1951. A further new play is shortly to be presented by the Manchester Green Room Club, who have already produced two plays by this distinguished authoress.
