"Up to 300 words on the author by the week-end; the usual thing—when he was born, how many plays he's written, what he does, etc., etc."

It sounded reasonable enough—until I had put the receiver back and taken stock of just how much I did know about Rodney Diak, which didn't seem much then and seems even less now. Date of birth? No idea—try 1930 as a rough guess. Number of plays written? Very few, I believe: he has a high standard of self-criticism and only counts the ones which have passed his own censorship. consigning to oblivion those which do not come up to expectations. Of the successful ones, this is the second to be produced; another having had its premiere performance in Bromley, Kent, a year or so ago.

As for what he does—now we are on more fruitful ground. He acts—professionally. You will find his name on the Old Vic programmes in 1949 for Love's Labour's Lost and She Stoops to Conquer; the season when Michael Redgrave played Hamlet, Marlowe and Berowne. More recently he was at Edinburgh, playing in the last festival; and this was followed by a brief London appearance at St. Thomas's Church, in Regent Street. Latterly he has been in Coventry with the Midland Theatre Company playing, once again, in She Stoops to Conquer; only this time—graduation—he is the Marlowe, a performance which earned him a pleasant notice in "The Stage"—and also in "The Listener", following a broadcast of the production on March 26th.

Soon he will be off again. But it is our pleasure and privilege to welcome him to The Questors on the first night and again on the second Saturday of the run of his play. We hope he will enjoy it—we hope you will enjoy it—we know that we do.
