THE AUTHOR

Richard Whitehall was born on the 5th May, 1925. During the war he served in the Royal Navy, spending part of his time on convoys to Russia. His interest in the theatre began after the war, starting with ballet and later spreading to the fantasy and enchantment of the theatre of Ustinov, Fry, Bridie and Anouilh. His first play, A Ballad and the Moon, was given a reading by the Questors at a Club Night in May, 1952; and he is at present working on another comedy in verse, The Skylark Singing. He finds that writing in verse imposes a discipline that is helpful. His only other interest beside writing and theatre is ornithology. But his main aim is to go on writing plays, and he would most like to write for a permanent group of actors on the lines of the Barrault-Renaud Company. The influence of the Birmingham Repertory Theatre and the Nottingham Playhouse (the two theatres nearest to his home, near Uttoxeter) has served to make him a confirmed "grouper."

These few facts must suffice. Richard Whitehall says that, as a playwright, he owes everything to the Questors: "They gave a reading of my very first play, A Ballad and the Moon, and now they are producing my first performed play, The Night Before Spring." He also asked that, if a programme note were to be published, we should concentrate on his past relations with the Questors: "This would, I am sure, have more interest to the audience than a potted biography of someone they don't know, and probably wouldn't like very much if they did." Whether or not this may be true, at least we hope you will enjoy his play this evening.
