#### NOTE ON THE PLAY

Lennox Robinson was born in Co. Cork, Ireland, in 1886, and he was for many years General Manager of the Irish National Theatre.

He has written a number of plays, all of which had their first performance at the famous Abbey Theatre, Dublin. He is best-known for his comedy "The Whiteheaded Boy," which has been compared with J. M. Synge's "The Playboy of the Western World."

"The Far-off Hills," written in 1928, is almost a companion picture to the former, and is another study of dream and reality, a favourite theme of his. All Lennox Robinson's later plays reveal a subtle dramatic skill and an affectionately cynical insight into human nature. His contribution to the school of Irish realism has been considerable. He is now, at the age of 71, Director of the Abbey Theatre, on whose stage his first play was performed fifty years go.
