#### PRODUCER'S NOTE

Molière, one of the greatest French comic playwrights, if not *the* greatest, has for generations been the subject of discussion among critics and scholars, not as a writer or a poet or the creator of a tradition of acting, but rather as a man of morals and ideas, as though his calling were that of a teacher—and this is perhaps a measure of his achievement.

There is little doubt that his great and everlasting merit lies in the fact that whereas drama before him was confined to vulgar farce, with stock characters and situations, he created what is now known all the world over as comedy, raising contrived and artificial plays to the level of true art. More than this: he set standards which served as a yardstick for comedy and comic acting throughout the world.

He was a man of the theatre; not only a writer, but a very good actor too, and it is not surprising that his plays have survived to this very day, although often (and justifiably) modernized in their idiom—as in the case of "The Miser." They are about human failings, give a commentary of life, still valid to-day, and the comic spirit which abounds is as potent as ever.

Molière at all times had the audience's enjoyment very much at heart, but the laughter he wants to incite is never bitter or condescending, nor does he lack understanding or compassion for the human weaknesses his characters portray. His plays disturb by their very humanity.

We have chosen the famous adaptation by Miles Malleson since it skilfully weaves old into new, and we hope that in giving the play its original frame, the proscenium of the Palais-Royal, we shall arouse your imagination at the outset and with little effort carry you back some three hundred years.
