- ACT 4. Professor Higgins' study, midnight, six weeks later.
- ACT 5. Mrs. Higgins' drawing room, the following morning.

There will be an interval of 5 minutes after Act 1, 2 and 4. The main interval of 15 minutes will follow Act 3; during this interval you may remain in your seats and be served with tea and biscuits at a fixed charge of 6d., or cross to the Lounge where coffee and light refreshments may be obtained.

NOTE ON THE PLAY

Shaw has frequently been accused, not always unjustly, of using the stage as an instrument of propaganda, to the detriment of the dramatic quality of his plays. We know of his advocacy of the 40-letter alphabet, and it would not have been surprising if "Pygmalion" had become merely a propagandist piece. For Higgins, the professor of phonetics, is the inventor of such an alphabet and Shaw says in his preface "... if the play makes the public aware that there are such people as phoneticians, and that they are among the most important people in England at present, it will have served its turn."

But those who seek to reform the alphabet will find scant support for their views in the play itself. Here Shaw the reformer stands aside, leaving Shaw the comic dramatist in undisputed command. Perhaps this is why, although Eliza's rude word has lost something of its first electrifying impact, "Pygmalion" retains its freshness after nearly fifty years of performance.
