PARIS 1863

France in the mid-nineteenth century was in one of her periodic turmoils. Napoleon III occupied the throne and by 1863 (the date of this play) was in difficulty with his finances and with nearly all his diplomatic neighbours. The Crimean war was only one of the blunders of the "Imperial Meddler." Meanwhile Bismark, who had become Chancellor of Prussia the previous year, was quietly stropping his sabre and biding his time.

The Second Empire was at the beginning of its decline.

However hollow and bankrupt the Empire's political structure, its facade was brilliant. Napoleon constituted his court on elaborate and resplendent ceremonial. It set the tone for society. Life in Paris was a constant round of balls, banquets, state visits to the theatre and the opera. This was the time the city built up its reputation for elegant luxury and carefree gaiety. The serious-minded found much to question, others jumped on the band-waggon.

In the theatre the Comédie Française no longer had the monopoly of the Capital's resources. Reputations were being made elsewhere, The dramatists of the time reflected the facets of the regime. The younger Dumas and his contemporaries explored current social problems, but Labiche, revolting against this approach held the torch of farce high with resounding success.

With various collaborators he wrote over 150 light comedies between 1838 and 1877. His humour is basic stuff, but he raised French farce to a height it has seldom attained since, and gave life and gaiety to the theatre of an era that has gone forever.
