William Saroyan began the play "The Cave Dwellers" under the working title "The End." When the play was finished he could as easily have applied his other favourite title "The Beginning," for the play is both an end and a beginning.

In his introduction to the play, the author says "Every playwright creates a human race . . . (but) The truth of his race does not lie in its resemblance to the real human race."

The creation of a human race necessitates the creation of a world for these new beings to inhabit. It is this which can be termed "The Beginning." The point of departure from the real human race is "The End."

"The Cave Dwellers" is, then, at least partly concerned with the making of a new race and of a home for that race. All of this occurs on the stage of an abandoned theatre because: "All buildings are caves and because the theatre is the cave at its best—the last arena where all is always possible."

It would, however, be an injustice to limit our understanding of the play to this one theme. The characters are as broad as life, and the joy and love which the playwright has lavished on them are there to be enjoyed in themselves and for themselves.
