PROGRAMME NOTE

All three plays we present tonight are "modern" in that they dispense with the "well-made" lben tradition of the realistic theatre and use overly theatrical methods of presentation in order to capture the complexities of existence in modern times.

Each play betrays its author's fiercely individual styles. Jonesco is at one moment impish and satirical, and at the next full of sincere concern for man's fate. Adamov is austere, relying more on action to explain his thenee, than on words. Strindberg's dictum, 'Drama is 'dialogue admay,' turns with Adamov into 'Drama is 'business' and 'business' drama.' Ghelderode's 'Columbus'' shows some influences of the expressionist drama, but it is, we flink, ''modern'' even in terus of the fifties and skyties. Aunt Edna was quite young when the play was written in 1927. She did not quite appreciate it then. We hope you will.

This is the British premiere of the play.
