



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

FIRST PERFORMANCE

SATURDAY, 19th OCTOBER, 1968

Fire and Aire, Water and Earth, are not the elements of Man; Inward decay, and outward violence, bodily pain, and sorrow of heart may be rather styled his Elements; And though he be destroyed by these, yet he consists of nothing but these. Iohn Donne (1572-1631)

Christopher Marlowe was born in Canterbury in February, 1564, Shakespeare's birth year. He was educated at King's School, Canterbury, and in 1583 he took a B.A. at Benet (Corpus Christi) College, Cambridge, followed by an M.A. in 1587. Marlowe's work in the theatre covered about six years, 1587-1593. During that time he wrote both parts of "Tamburlaine the Great," "Doctor Faustus," "The Jew of Malta," "The Massacre of Paris," "Dido, Queen of Carthage"; and "Edward the Second," which is roughly contemporary with the second and third parts of Shakespeare's "Henry VI." Marlowe was well known for his atheistic and amoral opinions; indeed, a warrant was issued for his arrest just before he was stabbed to death in a tavern brawl at Deptford. This was in June, 1593. He was not yet thirty.

Marlowe's "Edward the Second," or, to give the play its full title, "The Troublesome Raigne and lamentable death of Edward the Second; with the tragicall fall of proud Mortimer: And also the life and death of Peirs Gaveston, the great Earle of Cornewall, and mighty favourite of King Edward the Second" was probably first performed in the closing months of 1592. Marlowe took licence with the historical facts as given in Holinshed, transposing and altering events to suit the framework of his play. Edward's reign was some twenty years in fact; in the play, the action appears to be continuous. But it is not a 'history play' in any sense: rather a depiction of the weakness of character and the corruption of the spirit.

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
