Edward Albee's play, WHO'S AFRAID OF VIRGINIA WOOLF? appears on the surface to be mainly concerned with the agonised relationship of George and Martha. However, the background and time of the play is an indigenous part of their relationship.

The 50's and early 60's was a time for conformism in the States "The silent generation" of non-protester and acceptors of the status-quo was flourishing. The dream of "success" as stated by Martha negated the role of the intellectual non-conformist and stressed the importance of the academic as a University politician. To belong to the American "old-boy" network of Rotary Club popularity was important if the academic wanted to succeed. Albee questions the validity of this kind of success and asks us to examine what we think. He asks questions about reality and illusion and the role of the humanist as opposed to the scientist. Above all, he asks how can a relationship survive when a husband and wife approach life from two opposing points of view. In truth these questions are pertinent for England as well as elsewhere.




