Since 1960 The Questors has presented a New Plays Festival every year and so far we have presented 37 new plays. The whole purpose of the Festival is to enable new authors to see their work mounted as well as possible; something that is not possible within the strict consinens of the professional theatre, although "fringe theatre" and lunchtime theatre clubs are now available to short experimental work.


Finding three plays for the Festival is always a difficut task. The theatre receives the scripts of two to three plays a week on average, which are circulated to a panel of readers. If the opinions expressed by the readers are favourable, the members of the Plays Committee read the script and decide whether the play should be produced by The Questors. We have in the past commissioned plays from dramatists and indeed you will remember that last year, the tenth anniversary of the Festival, we commissioned all three plays from dramatists whose work had linked them closely with the theatre.

This year our commissioned play is "The Others" by David Mowat. The second play in the Festival, "All The Lonely People", is by an acting member of The Questors, David Pearson.

It had been our intention to stage David Crampton's "Wonderchick" this year but a previous commitment to another group had to be honoured. However, we were fortunate to obtain "The Life & Death of Almost Everybody" as soon as it left his typewriter.





JAZZ AT THE HUSTINGS

POETS IN PERSON

DANNIE ABSE

Born in South Wales, 1923. Three plays for previous New Plays Festivals have been published under the title "Three Questors Plays". One of them "The House of Cowards" won the Charles Henry Foyle Award for 1960 and has recently been included in an American publication "Twelve Great Plays".

During the 1967 New Plays Festival he took part in the programme "Poetry and Jazz in Concert" and also organised and took part in poetry readings in 1968 and 1969. He has had six books of poems published, the latest being "Selected Poems" (published in Great Britain by Hutchinson and in America by O.U.P.). In October of this year his novel "O. Jones, O. Jones" will be published by Hutchinson.

EDWIN BROCK

Born in London in 1927. Has been successively a sailor, journalist, policeman and is currently on adman. Started to publish poetry in newspapers and magazines after the war—first collection "An attempt at Exorcism" was published in 1959 (Scorpion Press). Followed by "A Family Affair", 1960 and "With Love from Judas", 1962 (both Scorpion Press). Has written one novel "The Little White God" published in 1961 (Hutchinson) and later in paperback (Pan). Last year McMillan published "Fred's Primer", a sort of satire and early next year will be publishing the sequel "Paroxisms", both illustrated by the author's wife. Published in Penguin Modern Poets series (No. 8). Most recent collection "A Cold Day at the Zoo" published this year by Rapp & Whiting. Currently putting together a new collection of poetry and writing which he describes as "a kind of chunk of autobiography".

MICHAEL HAMBURGER

Born 1924 in Berlin and came to England, where he was educated, in 1933. Served in the Army 1943-47. Free-lance writer 1948-52. University Lecturer for the next twelve years at University College, London, and Reading University. Became free-lance writer again in 1964 with visiting appointments at several American Universities. Books of poetry published: "Flowering Cactus" (1950), "Poems 1950-51" (1952), "The Dual Site" (1957-Routledge), "Weather & Season" (1963-Longmans), "Travelling" (1969-Fulcrum Press). Also published in Penguin Modern Poets series (No. 14). Has written numerous translations and critical works. Latest work, published this year, "The Truth of Poetry" (Weidenfeld and Nicolson).
