



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JOHN ROLFE'S JAZZMEN

in the Stanislavsky Room on Thursday, 24th June at 8.00 p.m.

A group of musicians will gather together and look, with varying degrees of success, for the expressive string of notes which makes good jazz. They will hope to discover the best tempo and find the liveliest dynamics and uncover the most harmonic structure they can, but these things cannot be found unless the atmosphere is right. This is where you come in. Perhaps you, the potential audience member, knows nothing about jazz or even nothing about music, but this is not important. If you like the unpredictable, the unplanned, the unique moment, then improvisation is for you. If you are interested in helping to create a relaxed (or tense) atmosphere which brings out the best music, then come. If you want to co-operate in what has to be a group activity then look into the session on the 24th.

Jazz must always be new so it fits into the Festival well and this particular evening should be interesting because it happens to be Midsummer Night. So we have the necessary magic, the appropriate musicians, adequate ale, all that is needed is a group of vivacious, friendly individuals who will talk through all the silences between numbers. One rule only --please do not applaud.
