

'O BARE BEN JONSON'

The Alchemist has caused a great deal of laughter for over 350 years and, apart from a gap in the nineteenth century when it was represented on the stage by farces centering on Drugger's activities, it has rarely been out of repertory. Some of this success is due to the fact that it is a very funny play whose humour is understandable to people of all times. We may not have our Alchemists in this technological age, but the avidity with which we swallow medicines and drugs and the credulity with which we listen to garage mechanics, suggests that twentieth century man is as gullible as his Jacobean ancestor. Above all Jonson concentrates on avarice. It is the central motive which drives his characters on to absurdity after absurdity. It has been argued that the play is immoral because the leader of the confidence tricksters gets away handsomely, while the other two at least go unpunished but Jonson is making a deeper comment. The superiority of Doll, Face and Subtle lies in their self-appreciation. They want money and they know it. They do not put forward hypocritical reasons as Mammon or Tribulation do. Their dishonesty has a certain honesty about it!

1972 is the four hundreth anniversary of Ben Jonson's birth and we are presenting this play to celebrate it.

He must have been an extraordinary man. He started his career as an apprentice bricklayer, fought in the Netherlands against Spain, killed a fellow actor in a duel and was nearly executed for it; ran into more trouble with the authorities over his catholicism and was imprisoned and threatened with having his nose and ears slit for rash jokes about the King. On top of this his plays teem with his learning. A great classical scholar, he must also have been an expert on contemporary arts and science. Every reference to Alchemy in the play, while appearing mumbo jumbo to us, would have been persuasive orthodoxy to the Elizabethans. Finally he was a playwright for nearly 40 years, writing over 30 plays and many of the court masques.

It has been a privilege and a pleasure to work on one of the best of his plays. We hope we give you equal pleasure and hope you will join with us in echoing
