A NOTE TO THE PLAY

The Emperor of the Holy Roman Empire was elected by the sovereigns of some of its constituent States, who were thus known as Electors. Saxony and Brandenburg were two of these Electorships. In the 16th century, however, the Empire was in decline, the Emperor, a Habsburg in Vienna, had only nominal power, and the various States possessed virtual autonomy.


