

LOVE'S LABOUR'S LOST was probably written in the 1590s for a private performance in the garden of an Elizabethan country house before being revised for the theatre. The text is highly inconsistent in its style and quality of writing. This may be caused by the play, which obviously suffered many alterations, and contains omissions, repetitions and unexplained contradictions. Nevertheless, the magic holds as we watch the young playwright feeling his way towards the mature comedy of mood and character which he invented.

The play is concerned with growing up. The men begin by being more in love with being in love than with the ladies, and despite the girls' apparent sophistication there is a great deal of insecurity in their attitudes. There are no easy romantic resolutions for these lovers. By the end there is a dawning realisation of the truth of love; the growing up process is under way but 'the world-without-end bargain' is a subject 'too long for a play'.

One of the real charms of the play is its infatuation with language. Puns, quibbles and conceits tumble over themselves. There is a feeling that language is new, forming, changing, even while it is being spoken. Berowne's mockery of Armado, 'a man of fire-new words', carries a description of Shakespeare's own ambivalent attitude to himself as a word spinner. The pedant delights to savour 'a word well culled, chose, sweet and apt', though the joke is all the greater because the foreigner has scatologically mangled the language.

We have enjoyed rehearsals. We hope 'We will turn it finely off, sir; we will take some care.'
