DAVID STOREY

The son of a miner, David Storey was born in Yorkshire in 1933 and studied at the Slade School of Art. His first, highly successful novel, 'This Sporting Life', was published in 1960 and awarded the U.S. Macmillan Fiction Award. 'Flight Into Camden', published the same year, won both the John Llewellyn Rhys Memorial Prize and the Somerset Maugham Award. 'Radcliffe' followed in 1963. He wrote the screenplay for This Sporting Life, and has written and directed several films for television. The Restoration of Arnold Middleton, his first play, was performed at the Royal Court Theatre in 1967 and later transferred to the Criterion, Piccadilly. It won an Evening Standard Drama Award for the same year. In Celebration was staged at the Royal Court in 1969. In 1970, within four months of each other, both The Contractor and Home transferred from the Royal Court to West End theatres. Home subsequently opened in New York with its original cast which included Sir Ralph Richardson and Sir John Gielgud. It won the Evening Standard Award for the best play of the year in 1970, and the U.S. Critics' Award for the best play of the 1970-71 season in New York. In 1971 David Storey won the first Writer of the Year Award given by the Variety Club of Great Britain.

SUE SOLOMON (Director) has been a member for some five years. Her last production as director was Female Transport in The Studio earlier this year and she previously directed Wedding Day. Sue acted whilst up at Oxford and was seen in As You Like It at The Questors, playing the part of Phoebe. Playing the piano and the harpsichord provides her with relaxation.

CHRISTOPHER McDERMOTT (Harry) was last seen on stage at The Questors as a statue in Don Juan. Well-known at Teddington for his impression of George Robey with local groups, he also performs with the local theatre club - The Tempest being his last show. A newsagent and tobacconist, Chris enjoys painting in oils and watercolours when he is not busy treading the boards. His other appearances at The Questors include parts in Staircase, School For Scandal and A Borderline Case.

NEVILE CRUTTENDEN (Jack) admits to having been a member since 1964, during which time he has appeared in (among others) Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead, Happy Haven, King Lear, School For Scandal, an all-male production of The Maids, and most recently, Pinter's Landscape. Presently Vice-Chairman of The Questors, he was previously Director of Productions and is an exeditor of Questopics. Working in advertising, Nevile is married with two boys and two girls.

CARLA FIELD (Kathleen) is a librarian for the Borough of Ealing and is, not surprisingly, an avid reader of a wide range of books. Her last show at The Questors was Female Transport and among her many other shows she numbers The Ghost Train (Julia), Present Laughter (the Swedish maid) and regular appearances in melodramas. An ex-member of the Student Groups, Carla has been a member for 'a long time' and used to run the old Film Society. She was involved in an EMI recording of Twelfth Night in which she played Maria to the late Roger Livesey's Sir Toby Belch.

PEG SWEENEY (Marjorie) has had extensive experience of both professional and amateur theatre. She was an ASM at Minehead (playing maids, various), then at the National Theatre Company and understudied as the daughter in *The Father*, at the Piccadilly Theatre. She played the maid in *Oblomov* at the Comedy Theatre and has toured extensively with *An Inspector Calls, Gaslight, Spring and Port Wine* and *The Killing Of Sister George*. She did two seasons as Harold Rabbit in *Toad Of Toad Hall* and is a founder member of the Ensemble Theatre Company, which presented *Gone*, a new play by Dannie Abse, at this year's Edinburgh Festival Fringe. Peg was seen this year at The Questors as Wanda in *Kennedy's Children* and she was also in *Female Transport*.

PETER MacNAMARA (Alfred) was a member of the successful COARSE ACTING company which was seen at The Questors this summer prior to its debut at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe. He was previously in Hobson's Choice, The Good Woman Of Setzuan, The Lark and Funland, and is a regular member of S.C.R.E.W.U.—our House Services team. His first stage appearance came at the age of ten when he was in the Edinburgh Gang Show at the Gateway Theatre. An architect, Peter is a golf fanatic and also indulges in water ski-ing on a gravel pit outside Oxford.
