ABOUT THE AUTHOR.....

DOUGLAS VERRALL lives in St. Leonards-on-Sea, Sussex. He was born in East London in 1939. For sixteen years he has been a secondary school teacher, working in places as far apart as Hemel Hempstead and Long Island, U.S.A. He is currently teaching English and General Studies at a school in Hastings. He is married, with four children.

He writes about himself and about *Playground*, as follows:

"I have always been interested in the theatre. I have taken leading roles (e.g. Hamlet, Richard II, Prospero, Cassius) at the annual Pendley Shakespeare Festival in Tring, Hertfordshire (founded by the equestrian commentator Dorian Williams) since 1970 and have most recently acted at the Stables Theatre, Hastings with parts in *The Marchant of Venice* (Bassanio, directed by Peter Ling, writer of 'Crossroads'), *Separate Tables* (John Malcolm and Major Pollock), *The Rivals* (Falkland), *Equus* (Dysart) and *Old Times* (Deeley). My one-man show *Enter Will Shakespeare* has been performed over 50 times in schools, colleges and theatres.

With a full-time job and four children who dance, act and play pianos, violins and recorders, I have little time for writing. I wrote a very bad novel 'Sambo' over ten years ago, but have since had articles, reviews and poems published in 'New Christian', 'The Times Educational Supplement', 'Poetry South East 3', 'South East Arts Review' and 'New Fiction'.

Playground is my first full-length play. I wrote it as a result of taking the Advanced Certificate course at the Central School of Speech and Drama 1976-7. My second play about a family gathering for a photograph is 'on the way'."

Playground is the ninetieth full-length play to be premiered at The Questors Theatre. In addition to this, there have been sixty-three premieres of short plays. In April, there will be a premiere of a new play by James Saunders, The Girl In Melanie Klein. Several of his earlier plays, including Next Time I'll Sing to You, received their first performances at The Questors. His most recent play, Bodies is enjoying a long run in the West End.
