Though at next doore wee might meet Though shee were true, when you met her, And last, till you write your letter,


Yet shee

OTHELLO

Written in 1602/3. Dekker's *The Honest Whore* (1604) contains an apparent reference to *Othello* - 'a Barbarous Moor'. There are also borrowings from *Othello* in the 'bad' First Quarto of *Hamlet* (1603).

Performed in 1604, '... By the Kings Maiesties plaiers. Hallamas Day being the first of Nouember. A Play in the Banketinge house att WhitHall Called The Moor Of Venis.' (Revels Account).

1612-13. *The Moore of Venice* was one of the twenty plays given by the King's Men at the Revels preceding the marriage of Lady Elizabeth.

Registered; 6th October 1621. Thomas Walkley. Entred for his copie under the handes of Sir George Buck, and Master Swinhoe warden. The Tragedie of Othello, the moore of Venice.

Published: 1622. (First Quarto) 'The Tragedy of Othello, The Moore of Venice. As it hath beene diuerse times acted at the Globe, and at the Black-Friers, by his Maiesties Seruants. Written by William Shakespeare, London. Printed by N.O. for Thomas Walkley, and are to be sold at his shop, at the Eagle and Child, in Brittans Bursse, 1622'.

Source: A novella in Giraldi Cinthio's *Hecatommithi* (1565), though the story differs in detail from Shakespeare's. 'Disdemona' is the only character named; the Ensign loves her, and kills her, and the Moor is killed by her relations. Shakespeare seems to have read Cinthio's Italian, as no other contemporary version is known.

Stage History: 1660. 'To the Cockpit to see *The Moor of Venice* which was well done. Burt acted the Moor; by the same token, a very pretty lady that sat by me called out, to see Desdemona smothered.' (Pepys, 11th October).

1660, 8th December. Killigrew's Vere Street production with Margaret Hughes as Desdemona: probably the first appearance of an actress on the public stage.

Othello was one of the few plays to escape 'improvement', and has been regularly performed since its first appearance on the stage. It is very popular in the U.S.S.R.
