Tennessee Williams died last year at the age of 72. A prolific writer not only of plays but of screenplays, poems, novels and short stories, he received a Rocke-feller fellowship at the University of Iowa and won the Pulitzer prize both in 1948 and 1955.

Period of Adjustment, written in 1960, is something of an experiment for him as it is in the style of a typical Broadway marital sitcom that even borders on the farcical. But his well-known themes of sexual frustration and disillusionment with the so-called American Dream are never far below the surface and sometimes are so dominant that for moments you can forget it is meant to be a comedy at all.

Indeed the aftertaste is surprisingly bitter and sad, like that of some of Alan Ayckbourne's social satires — so much so that the critics and Tennessee Williams himself are in two minds as to whether the ending is really as happy as it seems

Set, like many of his plays in the Southern States, these middle-class characters with their comfortable lives and little problems would seem to have none of the shattering physical and mental defects found in some of his earlier characters. But these people are not products of the pre-war Depression, they are living in the post-war fifties when the 'angry young men' had no excuse not to be successful.

The easy answer is to get rich quick and sell your soul to materialism, or to opt out completely and escape into fantasies of becoming a Wild-West cowboy or the first man in a moon rocket. The men in this play are like spoilt children hankering after their brief moments of past adventure and glory in the Korean war and unable to face up to the responsibilites of a humdrum existence. The women themselves trying to conform to the Hollywood image of the ideal woman, have the job of mothering their men back to becoming all-American husbands and fathers happily ever after.
