




THE QUESTORS THEATRE COMPANY



In 1900 *Punch* commissioned the 26-year-old William Somerset Maugham to write two short stories for them. One, a satire entitled *Cupid and the Vicar of Swale*, was received with moderate success and Maugham — a great recycler of his own material — rewrote it as a full-length play in 1903 and called it *Loaves and Fishes*.

But what had been acceptable as a short story was not admissible, apparently, in the theatre. Agent after agent turned Maugham away, and it was not until 1910 that Charles Froham, the producer who had already put Maugham's theatrical work in the history books by having four of his plays running in the West End at the same time (Lady Frederick, Jack Straw, Mrs Dot and The Explorer), agreed to mount a production.

The play was premièred at the Duke of York's Theatre on 24th February, 1911 — it was a critical disaster and ran for 48 performances. Maugham, however, was undismayed. He believed that the reason for its failure was the public's refusal to see a clergyman lampooned. He was probably right, because a novel he had written using the same material (he really was no wastrel) in 1906, entitled *The Bishop's Apron* was a huge commercial success. It seemed that the Edwardian public was happy enough to read such scurrilous material in the privacy of its own home, but to be seen laughing at it in a public theatre was not to be countenanced.

This present production offers you a rare opportunity to see for yourselves what all the fuss was about. Tasteless, or sparkling? Blasphemous, or hilarious? Feeble, or elegant? Now is your chance to decide.


