

#### **BARTHOLOMEW FAIR**

#### THE FAIR

The beginnings of St. Bartholomew's Fair are in the founding of the Priory and Hospital of St. Bartholomew by Rahere, a former court jester to Henry I, who had been converted after a deathbed recovery from malarial fever. What began as a cloth fair became by Jonson's time a huge general trade and pleasure tair, lasting three days and sprawling over four parishes. Jonson as a boy lived within a mile of Smithfield and there is some evidence that he attended the Fair not only as a fair-goer, but as a puppeteer. The Fair flourished throughout the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, but finally shrank away until it died out in the 1850s.

#### THE PLAY

Bartholomew Fair was first performed on 30th October 1614; it opened the Hope Theatre on Bankside. The following night it played (with suitable additions) at Court before James I. It seems to have been successful, and despite growing Puritan opposition to it, it is believed to have been frequently performed until the Commonwealth in 1649. After the Restoration it was swiftly revived: 1661 saw five productions of the play. It held the stage, although much adapted, until 1735 - and then received no performance until 1947, save for a badlyreceived revival by the Phoenix Society in 1921. Since 1947 it has received seventeen performances, both professional and amateur. Like other Elizabethan and Jacobean plays, it seems to appeal to a late twentieth century sensibility in a way it did not appeal to the sensibilities of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. Directors and critics disagree about why this should be. It has been seen as 'an attack on middle-class morality', a 'cynical and bitter play', a 'play about class struggle', a 'genial' play - one recent production was dismissed as a 'nice, clean, safe, bright, sweet Jacobean panto'!

Whatever view one takes, the central 'character' is the Fair itself; the people who belong to the Fair remain constant and unchanging amidst the flux and excitement, while those who come to the Fair from outside are changed and re-formed by their experiences. And the play re-asserts a common basic humanity: 'Forget your other name of Overdo', says Quarlous to the Justice, 'remember you are but Adam, flesh and blood'.

#### THE PROJECT

This play was chosen as a vehicle for a particular project: to involve in one of our productions those Questors members who do not normally have a chance to appear on stage or work behind stage. In all 76 people will appear on The Questors stage tonight; 50 have never done so before. Some are new Acting Members, many Audience Members, but there has been no distinction made in this production. The tapestry of the play demands a large cast of individuals who can weave in and out of the Fair, each making a distinctive contribution, each meshing with the others until Jonson's overall pattern is revealed.
