Fanny's First Play

by George Bernard Shaw

The Play was first produced at the Little Theatre, Adelphi, in 1911 with Lillian McCarthy, Harcourt Williams, Dorothy Minto and Nigel Playfair.

In this 'pot-boiler' Shaw attacks the 'dead as mutton' respectable tradespeople represented by the partners Gilbey and Knox of Denmark Hill, S.E.5. Their children, Margaret Knox and Bobby Gilbey, take his 'desperate' advice: 'Do something that gets you into trouble', and so break out of their deadly respectability.

Induction and Epilogue (Omitted this evening)

Set in Fanny's Country House. Shaw hid his own authorship behind Fanny, whose doting but devastated father, Count O'Dowda, introduces her to a specially invited audience of critics. A play which she has written at Cambridge is to be presented to them. It is 'Fanny's First Play', but they are not told the author. In the Epilogue Shaw lampoons the critics who are challenged to guess who wrote it. The four critics of 1911 are: the flowery Oxonian A. B. Walker of 'The Times' ('Trotter'); the dry satirical Gilbert Cannan ('Gunn'); the enthusiastic Baughan ('Vaughan') and the know-nothing popular journalist ('Flawner Bannal').
