

#### THE AUTHOR



EUGENE O'NEILL

He was born in New York city in 1888, son of a well-known romantic actor James O'Neill (1847-1920). He owed much to the invaluable theatrical experiences of his early days, which he spent backstage and on tour with his father and mother (who was not an actress). His early education was fragmentary but became settled when he attended a catholic boarding school. Later he enrolled as a student at Princeton University for one year (1906-1907). After a series of temporary business jobs he signed on as a merchant seaman. His voyages took him all over the world and he acquired a detailed knowledge of all the great waterfronts of New York, Buenos Aires, Southampton and other major ports. It was there he found the material that served as authentic background to his sea plays. The rigours of sea-faring began to take its toll on his health. He was forced to change his career and by 1919 he became an apprentice reporter on a newspaper in Connecticut. After only a few months his health broke down completely: tuberculosis was diagnosed and he spent the next six months recovering in a sanatorium. It was in this enforced period of reflection that he felt an irresistible urge to write plays. On leaving the sanatorium he became a student of English literature at Harvard University. Strindberg is the writer by whom O'Neill sems to have been most influenced. But it has been of his own experience and his sensitive feeling for life and human relations that his plays have come, exemplified most clearly in Long Day's Journey into Night, a hauntingly autobiographical play he did not live to see performed. He died in 1954, one of the most prolific and greatest dramatists America has produced.
