THE AUTHOR



David Hare was born in Sussex and educated at Lancing and Cambridge. He began writing in 1968, a year that for his generation will always reverberate with political significance. In that year also he formed Portable Theatre with Snoo Wilson, Tony Bicât and Howard Brenton, to take plays to places with no theatres. While directing Brenton's plays and writing his own, he also became literary manager of The Royal Court, a job he described as 'sheer grind'. His first play, written in collaboration with Tony Bicât, was "Inside Out" an adaption of Kafka's Diaries. In 1970 "Slag" won an Evening Standard Drama Award, while "Knuckle" was his first West End success in 1974. This play Hare claims 'foreshadows the arrival of Mrs. Thatcher'. It shows a controlled contempt for the raw capitalist ethic.

In 1975 Hare co-founded Joint Stock for whom he wrote "Fanshen" and then went on to work at The National Theatre where he became an Associate Director. There his collaboration with Howard Brenton on "Pravda" proved inspirational. Their creation of the monstrous Lambert Le Roux, a South African media magnate, proved one of the most attractive stage villains since 'Richard III.'

Hare's continued association with The Royal National Theatre has yielded some memorable productions, including "Plenty", "The Secret Rapture" and "Racing Demon".

The condition of England is the main focus of Hare's work and he exposes with economy and precision the greed and moral emptiness of those who flourish in the lower reaches of the political establishment.

It is a paradox that Hare's plays are so popular with the kind of West End audiences for whom his ideas should be anathema.
