

PlayBack is the reminiscence theatre initiative of The Questors Theatre. Founded in 1988, PlayBack exists to collect and share the oral history of Faling through reminiscence based community plays.

Kind Hearts and Comedies is PlayBack's third production. It was developed following the now well established method of collecting and transcribing individual's memories, this time from ex-staff who worked for Sir Michael Balcon at Ealing Studios in the forties and fiftles. The play does not set out to give a full or official history; the story of Ealing Studios is already well documented. Instead, Kind Hearts and Comedies aims to paint a picture of life at Ealing through the personal stories of those who worked behind the scenes creating the films which remain much loved classics today.

Very often in the play, the exact words of the contributors are used. Other scenes have been created by the team from the details given to PlayBack. In all cases, the characters are not intended to represent real individuals and the play combines the stories and points of view of many people. In doing so, PlayBack hopes to have captured the flavour of what went on at the little studio on the green, home of the great Ealing Comedies and a fondly remembered part of Britain's film industry.
