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ARTHUR WING PINERO

Born 1855, knighted 1909, died 1934

Pinero came of a line of Portuguese Jews who had been settled in England for several generations. Educated privately and at the Birbeck Institute, he was apprenticed to the law at his father's offices in Lincoln's Inn Fields. But amateur acting was his passion and at nineteen he obtained his first professional engagement as General Utility Man at the Theatre Royal, Edinburgh. After playing there and in Liverpool he joined the Lyceum company under the management of Henry Irving. He toured ("the worst Claudius ever seen in this city" was the opinion of one Birmingham critic) and a period with Squire Bancroft at the Haymarket followed. Pinero was not reckoned a good actor and after ten years toiling in the profession he turned to writing plays.

A one-acter *Two Hundred a Year* was produced in 1877 and a long line of successful works followed. Farces, richer in content and more intelligent than the current fare. Then dramas and straight comedy, more elaborate farces and sentimental pieces. Pinero revealed his talent for creating suspense, an extraordinary vitality, brilliant craftsmanship and the ability to write roles which leading actors were eager to play.

His range of work provided something to satisfy the taste of every theatregoer. The Profligate, The Money Spinner, The Amazons, The Cabinet Minister, The Thunderbolt, Sweet Lavender, His House in Order, The Schoolmistress, Iris, Letty, Mid-Channel, Dandy Dick, The Magistrate, The Second Mrs. Tanqueray (drawing-room Ibsen), Trelawny of the "Wells" and The Notorious Mrs. Ebbsmith (a "play of ideas") made him one of the most popular of all dramatists of his era.

"Trelawny" opened at the Royal Court Theatre on January 20th, 1898 and ran for 135 performances. Tom Wrench, the idealistic young playwright was immediately recognised as an affectionate portrait of Tom Roberston, the pioneer of 'cup and saucer drama' whose domestic realism had saved the theatre of the 1860's from farce, melodramas and Victorianised Shakespeare.

Pinero lived till 1934 but in his latter years his vogue declined and then faded away....

"...this new-fangled stuff, and these dandified people, are to push us, and such as us, from our stools." (James Telfer — Act 4 "Trelawny")

In "Trelawny", perceptively and prophetically, Pinero explored the theme of changing fashions in the theatre. It's a recurring phenomenon, echoed from age to age by dramatists and critics...

"If only we could abolish the visible orchestra; if we could have the stalls raised; if we could get rid of the boxes, with their tittering diners and supper-parties, and have total darkness in the auditorium during the performance; and if we could have a small stage and a small house, then perhaps a new dramatic art might arise." (Strindberg's foreward to Miss Julie, 1888.)

"It is probably fair to say that *The Vortex* changed the face of the British theatre in the twenties in the way that John Osborne changed it in the fifties with *Look Back in Anger.*" (Charles Castle in "Noël".)

The production of Look Back in Anger at the Royal Court in May 1956 is generally accepted as the birth of the modern British theatre and ushering in of a theatrical age which was surprisingly and suddenly rich. (Syndey Edwards on Osborne.)
