

### PETER SHAFFER

One of the foremost dramatists of our time, Peter Shaffer was born in Liverpool and educated at St. Paul's School and Trinity College, Cambridge. He had several varied jobs before earning fame as a playwright – working as a 'Bevin Boy' in the coal mines during the Second World War, in the acquisitions department of the New York Public Library and for the London music-publishing firm of Boosey & Hawkes.

His first big success came in 1958 with Five Finger Exercise. The play ran for nearly two years at the Comedy Theatre in London, and was subsequently presented with great acclaim in New York City. Other Shaffer successes include The Private Ear: The Public Eye (which, like Lettice and Lovage, starred Maggie Smith and played at the Globe Theatre); The Royal Hunt of the Sun, an epic drama concerning the Spanish conquest of the Inca Empire; the hilarious farce, Black Comedy; The Battle of Shrivings; Equus, a sensational triumph in London and in New York where it received the 1975 Tony Award for Best Play of the year; and Amadeus, which also won the same prize, as well as the 1979 Evening Standard Drama Award, the Plays and Players Award, and the London Theatre Critics' Award. Both these last mentioned plays boast the rare distinction of having run for over a thousand performances on Broadway and in 1984 the film of Amadeus won the Academy Award for both script and picture. His most recent plays are Yonadab, Lettice and Lovage which received the Evening Standard Drama Award for the best comedy of 1988 and The Gift of the Gorgon.

Robert Gore-Langton wrote in *The Daily Telegraph*: 'Though Shaffer is not the most political writer, his plays have had a surprising social influence. Take *Amadeus*, a musical whodunit which affected the taste of a generation. What hooked the audience was Shaffer's love for the music of Mozart, which he brilliantly communicated through the voice and ears of Salieri. When he researched the play there were about 10 books on the composer, now there are hundreds. Before the play a Mozart wind serenade might have sold 10,000 copies; after *Amadeus* sales of over a million became common.

Peter Shaffer himself wrote of Amadeus: "I was fascinated by the fact that the man who wrote the most serenely beautiful music ever was destroyed with laughter by a fart . . . Caroline Pichler, who knew Mozart, said she never once heard him say anything of the slightest profundity. That shocks some people, but I don't find it odd at all. It is not surprising that a man who lived so deeply on one plane could live so shallowly on another".
