


# **Anna Christie**

# A TRUE STORY

In 1977 Mike Green took a Questors Company for the first time to the Edinburgh Festival. It was *The Coarse Acting Show* and its critical acclaim and success with Festival audiences has subsequently spawned further tours to Edinburgh; a brief sojourn at The Shaftesbury Theatre, no less, and yet more World Coarse Acting Competitions. Indeed *Coarse Acting – The Revenge* is soon to be seen in this very

Theatre on the 10, 11 and 12 April.

Whilst in Edinburgh, we discovered many excellent watering holes, among them, the splendid pub "The Sheeps Heid" quite near to Arthur's Seat. One lunchtime, Richard Gaunt, John Turner and myself began to consider what ideas might be suitable for future "coarse plays". All sorts of suggestions were floated, but one particular idea we had was to contrive a piece whereby the action could be split into two so that the dressing room could be seen in parallel with the performance; the actors exposed on both sides of the curtain as it were. We considered dividing the theatre into two with one half of the audience seeing the show from the front of the stage and the other half behind the set. Fired with enthusiasm, we extended the idea to running the play twice, allowing the audience to swop places after the interval. The creative juices flowed; more beer was consumed and inevitably the conversation grew louder. What sort of play would allow such treatment? Shakespeare? Agatha Christie? Farce?

It was Richard who first noticed the man two tables away, busily making notes. Leaning forward Richard whispered "Don't look now, but I think someone's stealing our ideas". A man in a fawn trenchcoat was seated about seven feet away, holding a pen and a reporter's notebook. "I reckon he's been writing down what we have been saying!" said Richard, "he's been listening to us for ages". We changed the subject, discussed topics like golf, the weather and suchlike. Anything but our

latest "theatrical masterpiece in the making".

About four years later, Richard called me and said a play called *Noises Off* by Michael Frayn had opened at The Lyric Hammersmith and, on reading the reviews, it sounded exactly like the idea we had dreamt up, all those years ago. We went to see it in the first week and ironically it encapsulated all the ideas we had had in Edinburgh. The writing shimmered with brilliance and the production was superb; it was one of the funniest plays I had ever seen. Even today I can still recall that lunchtime in Edinburgh; was it Michael Frayn in the trenchcoat? Was he at the Festival and happened to chance on three "coarse actors" discussing their next project?

I have to own up to having my tongue pressed firmly into my cheek. The answer is surely no, because a prototype of *Noises Off*, called *Exits*, was conceived way before we went to Edinburgh, but I thought it would be fun to recall the incident. The brilliantly written play you are about to see could only have come from a talent and comic genius as great as Michael Frayn. It has been my privilege to direct *Noises Off* and work with such a brilliant cast and crew; occasionally, but not very seriously, reflecting on whether I might have, in some small way, been instrumental in its creation.

SELSDON MOWBRAY (Burglar) first 'trod the boards' in A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM with the Ben Greet Players, with whom he toured for three years, playing among other roles, Moth, Mustardseed and Nerissa. After many seasons in local rep he made it to the West End playing the drunken policeman in the highly acclaimed EXCUSE ME MR KELLY, which ran for seven years. He went to Stratford Ontario to play Mercutio, King John and the Porter in the 'Scottish Play'. After three years in Hollywood playing various English Butlers he returned to his native country to play KING LEAR in Portsmouth. He has appeared with the BBC Rep in various Shakespearean roles, more recently as Old Gobbo in THE MERCHANT OF VENICE.

More recently he appeared in the shortly lived and controversial all-male version of THE TROJAN WOMEN, as Larry Sunrise, the tap dancing newsvendor in the musical, WALL STREET SERENADE and as Stan Brownlow in A BACK IS STABBED, the award winning thriller set in the world of Rugby Union. He is happily married and lives near Crawley, where his wife breeds pedigree dogs. "If she ever leaves me" he says, "it will probably be for an Irish Wolfhound!



TIM ALLGOOD (Company Stage Manager) is in constant demand for his technical skills, but started his career as a Market Researcher. A chance visit to a production of THERE'S A GIRL IN MY SOUP converted him and he then spent six years in rep as an ASM. Tim has since worked backstage as SM on a number of successful shows such as MORE ARSENIC VICAR, A KILLER CALLS and CARDINAL KNOWLEDGE. DOTTY OTLEY (Mrs Clackett) makes a welcome return to the stage after playing Mrs Hackett, Britain's most famous lollipop lady (Ooh, I can't ardly old me lolly up! ") in over 320 episodes of TV's ON THE ZEBRAS. Born in Malta she trained at the Estelle Birkwood School of Drama and Allied Arts, winning the Bronze Medal and going on to the Embassy Theatre, Swiss Cottage, where, as an ASM, she gained experience in successful productions like AS YOU DESIRE and STARCHED APRONS. She later understudied Bee Duffell in HADDOCK'S EYES and Margaret Lockwood in PETER PAN at the Scala. A season with The King's Theatre, Peebles and two seasons with The Duke's Players, Lyme Regis, led to a prolonged stay in Australia where she enjoyed some of the biggest successes of her career. Currently writing her memoirs, "Completely Dotty", she lives in St John's Wood with her two dalmations, Ernest and Hemingway.



BELINDA BLAIR (Flavia Brent) has been on the stage since the age of four, when she made her debut in SINBAD THE SAILOR at the old Croydon Hippodrome as one of Miss Toni Tanner's Ten Tapping Tots. She subsequently danced her way round the UK, South Africa and the Far East in shows like ZIPPEDY-DOO-DA! and HERE COMES LES GIRLS! A damaged tendon led to her first straight parts in GOOD TIME GIRL and RING TWICE FOR RITA. More recently she has been seen in such comedy hits as DON'T MR DUDDLE!, WHO"S BEEN SLEEPING IN MY BED?, TWICE TWO IS SEX and PLEASE COME UNDRESSED, also with Lloyd Dallas as director. She is married to scriptwriter Terry Burke, who has contibuted lead-in material to most of TV's chat shows. They have two sons and three retrievers.



GARRY LEJEUNE (Roger Tramplemain) was twice winner of the Rose Bruford Medal for Effort. His many successful tours have brought him to Weston-super-Mare only once before, when he was starring in THE ADVENTURES OF A WINDOW DRESSER. He has made innumerable television appearances, but is perhaps best known as "Cornetto", the ice-cream salesman who stirs the hearts of all the lollipop ladies in ON THE ZEBRAS. Has recently made his screen debut as "M's" filing clerk in the new James Bond film "KILL ME SOFTLY".



LLOYD DALLAS (Director) read English at Cambridge. A Commonwealth Scholarship took him to Princeton, where he spent his time commuting to New York to see Arthur Miller plays and musicals on Broadway. Lloyd has directed plays in most parts of Britain, winning the South of Scotland Critic's Circle Special Award in 1979. In 1981 he directed a highly successful season for the National Theatre of Sri Lanka. He is perhaps best known for his brilliant anthology "Shakespeare in Summer" seen in many parks in various London Boroughs. He is currently working on a project to tour a new musical version of Chekov's THE CHERRY ORCHARD, entitled FAMILY TREES which includes the hit song "WE"RE MOSCOW BOUND".
