

#### A Word From The Director

'Wid your night yous choose to come and see us. Wid' our night as usual we's all getting' ready and turning out for a drink. THIS IS OUR ROAD! But tonight it's your road an'all..."

ROAD is still pertinent today, eighteen years after it was written. Described as an *Under Milk Wood* for Thatcher's Britain, ROAD captures the despair of millions of people in the late 1980s. The sad thing is that, while unemployment may no longer be so high, it has left a legacy of economic, educational and emotional impoverishment for several generations. Britain is still split into the haves and have-nots. And it's the have-nots that ROAD fixes on.

'And owt can happen tonight...'

An old lady makes herself up, very badly, for a night out; a melancholic man mourns the loss of his past; a despairing young couple starve themselves to death; an older woman drools over the young flesh of a pissed-up soldier; and more, many more... Eight actors will be playing over thirty characters – some so small you'll blink and miss them, some larger than life: all of them vital components of ROAD in all its many guises. It'll be fun to bring them to life and let them loose in the Playhouse. Don't be afraid, they don't bite – well, not all of them...

'You want something different. Stay, I mean it... We have a something that we always do when out side gets to you...'

ROAD may not have a conventional narrative, but its combination of laughter, violence, desperation and love is a journey in itself. And by the morning (the end of the play, as in *Under Milk Wood*), you'll be hoping that its' characters "SOMEHOW A SOMEHOW A MIGHT ESCAPE!"

#### Jim Cartwright

ROAD represented the theatrical debut of Jim Cartwright, who was born in Lancashire. Described by *The Sunday Times* as a "writer of outstanding talent", ROAD was a groundbreaking and influential play and was first performed in 1986. It won the Samuel Beckett Award in 1988, Drama Magazines Best New Play award, joint winner of The Plays and Players Award and The George Devine Award. The play launched his reputation as one of the country's most eloquent, radical playwrights and ROAD is now considered a modern classic.

After the great success of ROAD, Cartwright has gone on to write many more critically acclaimed plays. BED, 1989, TWO (1989), I LICKED A SLAG'S DEODORANT (1996) PRIZE NIGHT (1999), HARD FRUIT (2000), THE RISE AND FALL OF LITTLE VOICE (1992) Which won The Evening Standard Award for Best Comedy in 1992 and The Oliver Award for Best Comedy in 1993. The Play was then made into the successful film LITTLE VOICE in 1996. More of his plays have also been transferred to the screen. Including; ROAD (BBC 1987) winner of the Golden Nymph Award for Best Film; VROOM (Channel 4, 1988), WEDDED (BBC, 1990); BED (BBC, 1994) and two films directed by Danny Boyle entitled STRUMPET and VACUUMING COMPLETELY NUDE IN PARADISE in 2001.

#### The Background to ROAD: Britain In The 1980's

'I feel like England's forcing the brain out me head. I'm sick of it. Sick of it all. People reading newspapers: 'EUROVISION LOVERS', 'OUR QUEEN MUM', 'MAGGIE'S TEARS', being fooled over and over again...'

The early 1980's saw Britain in the grip of recession. Miners clashed with police in strikes against pit closures, riots broke out in several cities, stock markets suffered one of the biggest collapses in history and Britain dispatched a task force to recapture the Falkland Islands.

This is the backdrop to Jim Cartwright's play. ROAD captures what it was like to be living in an industrial town ravaged by the economic policies of the Conservative Party under Margaret Thatcher.

#### Margaret Thatcher

The Iron Lady of British politics, Margaret Thatcher was the longest continuously serving prime minister since 1827. Her conservative politics led to the implementation of such radically conservative policies as the poll tax. The Falklands was fought during her tenure. She resigned in 1990. During her time as prime minister unemployment rose to 3 million and her government continued to attempt to lower taxation and public spending, curb trade union power and follow a policy of privatisation.

#### Miners Strikes 1984/85

The Miners' Strike 1984/85 was a fight for a number of basic rights: the right to work, the right to live in a community of one's choice, the right for a future for oneself and one's children. The miners knew that when a works closes down, the community dies.

'What the miners, like most of us, mean by their communities is the places where they have lived and want to go on living, where generations not only of economic but of social effort and human care have been invested, and which new generations will inherit. Without that strong whole attachment, there can be no meaningful community' R. Williams, 1985

#### Falkland Islands

Following the Argentine invasion of the island in April 1982, Britain quickly sent a task force to protect the 1,200 inhabitants. The islands were recaptured in June when the Argentine force surrendered, after fighting in which more than 1,000 lives were lost (about 300 British and 700 Argentine.)

#### Privatisation

The sale or transfer of public or state-owned assets or services to the private sector. The policy was adopted by Thatcher's government in the 1980's. The aim was to reduce government spending and to try to create greater efficiency by freeing market forces from government intervention. One only has to look at today's newspaper reports concerning the state of the UK railway network to make one's own judgement as to the efficacy of this policy.
