





Travesties

by Tom Stoppard

Travesties

Those of you who are familiar with any of Tom Stoppard's work would be correct in suspecting that *Travesties* will take you on a fascinating, roller coaster journey, through diverse and eclectic subjects.

For those of you unfamiliar with this British playwright, hold onto your seats and prepare to be immersed in an ever-surprising world, where historical figures rub shoulders with well-loved theatrical characters.

Travesties is set in the unreliable and shifting memory of the aged Henry Carr, where he reminisces upon his time spent, as a young man, in Zurich, Switzerland, in 1917.

The real life Henry Carr was, in fact, living in Zurich in 1917. He had found himself in Switzerland as an 'exchange-prisoner' having been invalided out of the Canadian Black Watch after sustaining a bullet wound to the leg in France in World War I. In Zurich he gained an administrative post at the British Consulate, under the British Consul, A. Percy Bennett.

As a keen amateur actor, Carr was invited to play the role of Algernon in a production of Oscar Wilde's *The Importance of Being Earnest* staged by the English Players. This new theatre group had been set up by James Joyce, then a struggling writer from Dublin, who was also living in Zurich at that time.

Carr took his role as Algernon very seriously, spending several Swiss francs on a costume appropriate to the social standing of the character. Unfortunately, Joyce did not agree to reimburse his leading man's expenses and Carr vocally complained that Joyce had handed him a meagre sum for expenses 'like a tip'. A law suit ensued where Carr sued Joyce for his out-of-pocket expenses and Joyce counter sued Carr not only for five theatre tickets sold by Carr but also for slander.

Joyce won his money but lost his slander case. Not a man to be out done, Joyce immortalised Carr as an army private who treats his superior, sergeant-major Bennett with utter disrespect, in his literary masterpiece *Ulysses*.

These are the true historical facts that underpin Carr's shaky memory; but did he really know the Dadaist, anti-art poet, Tristan Tzara, or the Russian political revolutionary Vladimir Illyich Lenin and his wife Nadya, who were also in Zurich in 1917?

Events become increasingly confused for Carr as he fondly reminisces upon his acclaimed appearance in *The Importance of Being Earnest*.

And so, armed with these facts, join Henry Carr, on his cerebral, senile journey into his shifting world of *Travesties*.




COMING SOON




ISLE OF THE DEPARTED
