

'Tis Pity She's A Whore

'Tis Pity She's A Whore by John Ford

Ford - a mystery author

Not much is known of John Ford's early life except that he was baptized in Ilsington, Devonshire on 17 April 1586 and that he was admitted to the Middle Temple on 16 November 1602. It would seem that he was following in the family footsteps, although he was expelled in 1605 for failing to pay his buttery bill (a common offence) and not readmitted until 1608. There is little evidence that he wrote anything for the stage before 1621. He collaborated with Thomas Dekker and others on at least five plays until 1625 and then worked alone. The last of his plays was *The Lady's Trial* in 1639 and as nothing is known of him after that date it is generally assumed he died shortly after.

The incest theme

During the period Ford was writing, plays about incest were not uncommon – Tourneur's *Revenger's Tragedy*, Middleton's *Women Beware Women*, and Brome's *The Lovesick Court* were just some of the plays that dallied with the forbidden topic to a greater or lesser extent. However, *'Tis Pity* is the only play which makes incest its central theme and explores fully the nature and consequences of the relationship.

Although it is the main plot line, the subject of incest seems to take a back seat as the play unfolds and Ford contrives to show us a very 'domestic' world. Unlike Ford's other plays - here there are no kings or princes - it is a society peopled with characters shamelessly corrupt, greedy, violent and lacking in morality - even the church is not excluded in this corruption. Against this backdrop the incestuous relationship seems almost a pure act of love – the only alternative to passionate youth.

The notion of 'sin' and 'falling from grace' is pretty hard to get to grips with in today's permissive times. 'Passion' is something that sells chocolate and the concept of 'loyalty' is a card we take to the supermarket. To get a 'handle' on this we sought to create a backdrop which is as comparable to the Italy of 1633, in which passion, lust, revenge, honour, death, mindless violence, morality, retribution, Catholicism, deceit and corruption are constant themes.

Goodfellas meets The Godfather

The low-life mafia world of post war America seemed the perfect setting. This was still a time of the 'ideal family' and a society more closely allied with church and authority, and a concept familiar to us through such films as *Goodfellas* and *The Godfather*.

In fact it was the cinematic quality of the script – short scenes coming quickly one after the other - that lent itself to the direction of the play, the set and the soundtrack. The style is controlled, cool with the occasional eruptions of Italian passion. Floria's café becomes the central meeting point for the 'families' to do business, gossip can be traded and revenge plotted. The 1950s jukebox songs are the perfect symbol of a world of throwaway, disposable beauty - Annabella, the virgin prize whom the Mafia all desire, **is** Nat King Cole's Mona Lisa and Soranzo hums Dean Martin's That's Amore whilst preparing to woo his bride. Pencil skirts, sharp suits and the flash of a flick knife all add to the pervading atmosphere of casual violence.

It is a world in which there is an indifference to the daily diet of death and corruption. Today's tragedy will be easily forgotten, as soon as Giovanni's and Annabella's bodies have been 'bagged up' and once the Cardinal has finished his dinner. There's little pity here - for whores or anyone.



A double bill by Tony Rushforth


Seascape: The action focuses on two contrasting, romantic brief encounters.




