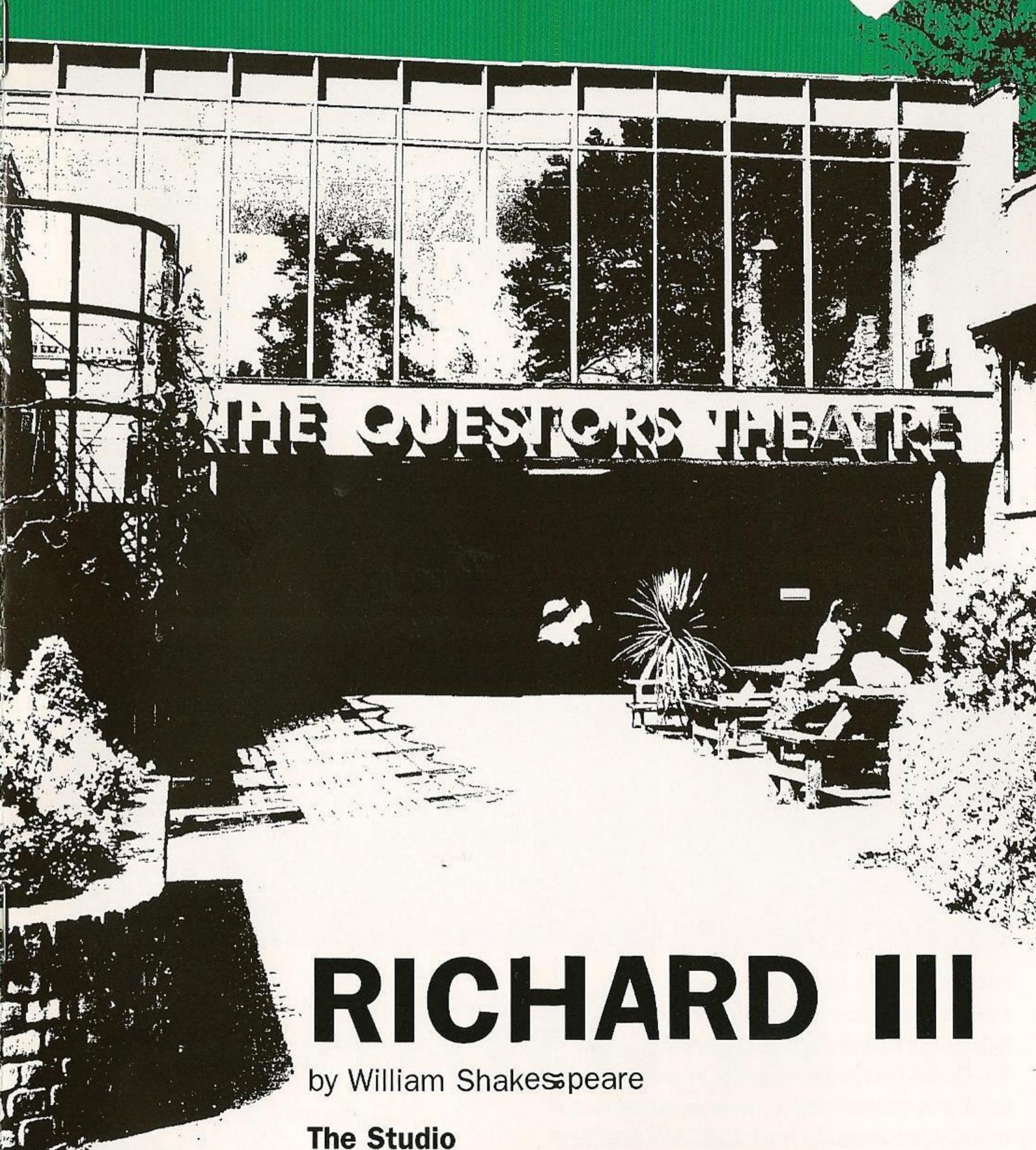

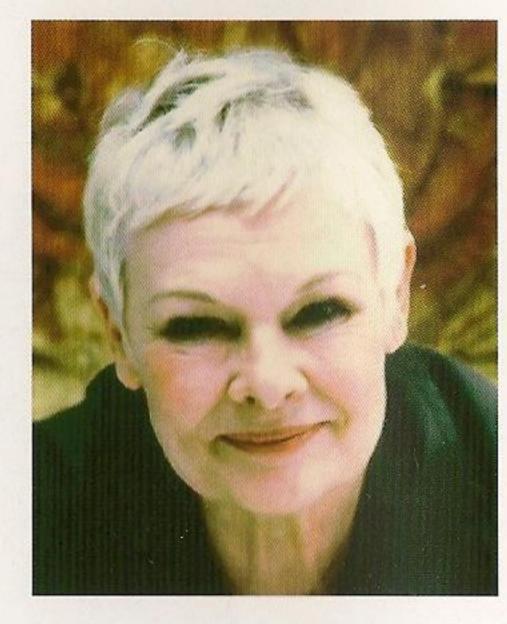


Welcome to The Questors Theatre, one of London's best kept secrets – except to its 2,000 members.

RICHARDIII

by William Shakespeare Directed by Mark Fitzgerald

The Tragedy of *Richard III*: with the landing of Earle Richmond and the Battell at Bosworth Field

Published in 1623 by two of the sharers in Shakespeare's company, Heminge and Condell, this for me is the most reliable version of his plays. Before its publication there were Quarto versions of the plays, some very good and some pirated versions.

Most modern editions of *Richard III* are interpretations of the Quarto version. It is shorter and needs fewer actors, so is thought to have been put down from a touring version.

The more the play was performed, the more Shakespeare rewrote it and the First Folio is the final, tried and tested, performance text used in his playhouses. Here is an example of a very big change to a play: the prologue to *Romeo and Juliet* does not appear in The Folio. Why? Maybe they discovered that telling the audience that the two main characters are going to die, before the play starts, is not such a good idea after all!

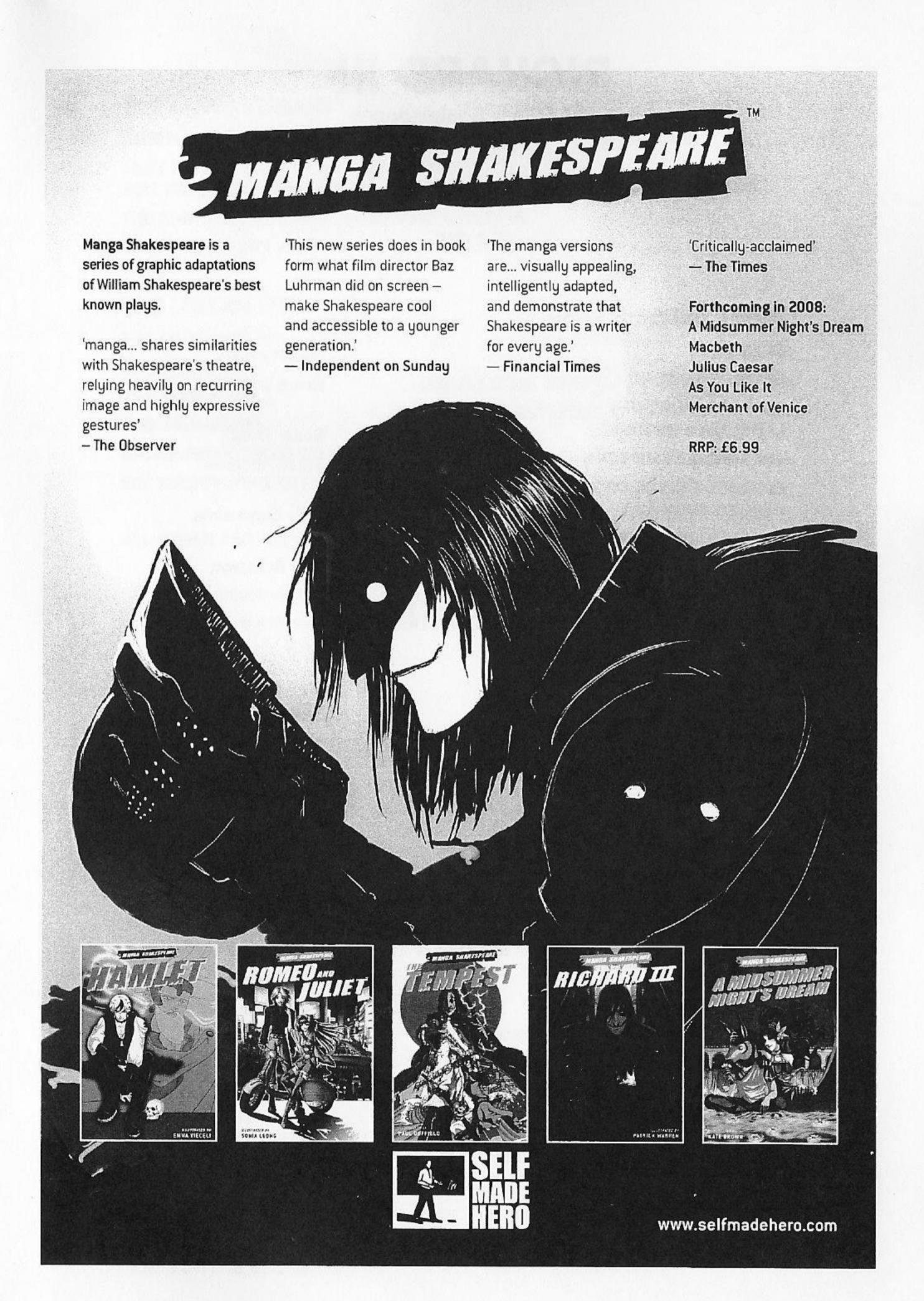
Modern editions are prepared and strongly edited by literature scholars. They use their interpretation of the source text, change the punctuation and, at times, the line layout and actual words. For example, the Arden edition says in its foreword that 'No editor can desert the First Folio punctuation without careful consideration' and goes on in 3014 lines of text to make 1466 changes and a further 224 changes to the shape of the lines, the reason being that the way it is laid out in the Folio is not grammatically correct and they feel the original is full of typing errors.

Put simply, they are wrong. The First Folio is a performance text written for actors. It is not literature but a dramatic work. Over the years, people have spent more time reading Shakespeare's plays and performing his sonnets though the sonnets are meant to be read to oneself and the Plays are meant to be spoken aloud. The 'typing errors' are in fact scoring on the script to give an actor advice on how to play it, which include long sentence structures, important plot words capitalised, unfinished lines of verse to allow stage business and dramatic pauses, phonetic spelling for regional accents, and the list goes on.

To a non-theatre practitioner this looks like a jumbled mess but to me it looks like heaven and immediately shows me how it should be said, when to go fast, when to slow down and when to pause. It tells me when to point up plot points, to pick out when my character is under pressure or lying, when they cry, laugh or get angry. It is without doubt the fastest way to work and truly shows you the genius of Shakespeare the director.

That is the reason for using the entire First Folio version of this play for our production. Let's see how it plays without cuts or changes in the text. At this stage of rehearsals it is working incredibly well and the scenes are jumping off the page. Decide for yourself.
