


Café

HENRY VI

by William Shakespeare

Henry VI – the story so far:

PART ONE

After Henry V's death the nine-month-old Henry VI is placed into the protection of Humphrey, Duke of Gloucester. Richard Plantagenet, who has a claim to the throne through the Mortimer line of the family, decides to oppose the Duke of Somerset and Henry's side. At a meeting in the Temple Gardens they each decide to pluck a rose to indicate the opposing houses. Richard chooses the White Rose, and Somerset, the Red Rose.

Meanwhile the French Dauphin begins to win back the lands won by Henry V. Gloucester cleverly arranges a marriage between Henry VI and Margaret of Anjou. But in France Suffolk has captured Margaret and falls in love with her. He woos Margaret to become Henry's Queen. On his return he persuades Henry to marry Margaret against the will of many of the court. The affair between Suffolk and Margaret continues.

PART TWO

There is peace between France and England, but not in the English court. The nobles unite in their common aim to remove Gloucester. His wife aspires to the crown and is lured by John Hume, a priest in the pay of Suffolk, to consult with a witch about her ambitions. She is tried for witchcraft and banished. This forces Gloucester to resign his staff of office, allowing Henry to become King.

Somerset returns with the news of the loss of the French territories. York seizes the opportunity to implicate Gloucester and accuse him of treason. Gloucester is murdered and the King turns against Suffolk, who is then banished and eventually murdered.

York, supported by his sons Edward, George and Richard and by Salisbury and Warwick returns to claim the Crown. The two sides take up arms, the House of York and the House of Lancaster headed by Henry. Somerset is killed by Richard, who then chops off his head and carries it away from the battlefield in a bag.

So begin The Wars of the Roses.

In this production we use the whole of Part Three. We have also included some scenes from Part One and Part Two.


