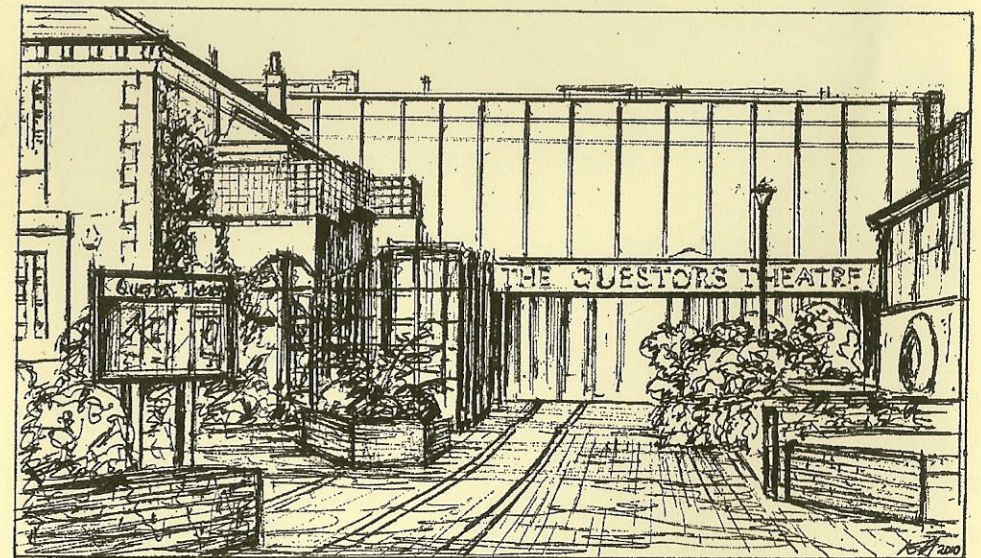

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Ladies' Day

Originally written for Hull Truck Theatre Company, *Ladies' Day* has been produced by many theatre companies all over the country since its premiere in 2005. There are many good reasons for this, not least because it offers four brilliant, substantial parts for women. There are men too. In fact, the script does suggest that the six male characters can be played by one man. I decided against this for a number of reasons. Firstly, this play really does focus on the women and to risk bringing more attention to one male actor would imbalance the piece. I was also lucky enough to have plenty of talented men audition for the production, so was more than able to cast six men to play the small but lovely and important male roles.

In 2005, Ascot racecourse was being refurbished and so the whole summer event of Royal Ascot was relocated to York racecourse. This provides the stimulus for the story of a group of women working in a fish plant in Hull putting on their best hats and setting off to Ladies' Day. Taken away from their normal, relentless routine and into an unfamiliar and glamorous environment, they have the chance to pursue their own dreams and ambitions – be that meeting Tony Christie, rubbing shoulders with celebrities in the hope of making it as a star, catching a glimpse of the Queen or taking one last shot at a dream which is almost over.

On first reading the script, my initial concerns were that it may be difficult to relate to these working class women and take them seriously. I wanted audiences to be laughing with the women, not at them. However, it didn't take long for Amanda Whittington's wonderfully drawn characters to emerge and speak for themselves and by the end of my first reading I was convinced of this play's warm heart. There is plenty of humour drawn from the situation but not at the expense of these women and their very real troubles, secrets and dreams. Reminiscent of Victoria Wood's excellent series *Dinnerladies*, this similarly provides funny characters who we care a great deal about and who find courage to overcome their circumstances. Exploring the delicate balance which exists within female relationships, their friendships are tested to the limit and they all face life-changing decisions.

In their own ways, the ladies are all close to a boundary within their own lives and either pushing to break through or anxiously holding back. The situation fuels these changes and by the end nothing will ever be the same again.

This has really been a happy rehearsal process and is a testament to the gorgeous people on board. We've had fun playing with ways to show the fish factory (sans fish), discovering the tic-tac signals and immersing ourselves in the songs of Tony Christie whose songs are the inspiration for the choice of racing horses and feature heavily throughout the piece. The Hull accent has posed no problem for the actors, but has instead provided humour when discussing "cans of Kirk".

The challenge of portraying two very different settings in a small, intimate space like The Studio was no problem as we have been lucky enough to have a very experienced designer who has realised it all beautifully.

The cast and crew have all had great fun rehearsing this show and we wish you the same joy in watching it.

Biographies

Robert Baker-Glenn – Joe

As well as acting, Robert has worked as a radio presenter, a director and a choreographer. His most recent appearances have been in *On Show* (a celebration of dance at the Royal Albert Hall), *Much Ado About Nothing* for Unmasked Productions and, for The Questors, *A Christmas Carol* (which he also choreographed) and *Otherwise Engaged*. He will be appearing in *Hobson's Choice* at The Questors in January.

Sherralyn Lee – Shelley

Sherralyn started acting at 5 years old, and since has studied drama at college and university. She has performed with frantic assembly in *The Service Charge* at the Lyric Theatre Hammersmith. She has also performed at a plethora of other theatres including The Beck, The Union Theatre and Battersea Arts. This is Sherralyn's third Questors production, the others being *The Accrington Pals* and *The Libertine* both directed by Mark Fitzgerald. Sherralyn has also been cast in *Hobson's Choice* which runs at the beginning of next year.

David Hovatter – Jim McCormack

David has spent most of 2010 on one play: directing and acting in Aphra Behn's restoration comedy, *The Rover*. After a week in the main Playhouse in April, the cast met regularly to adapt the production for the open-air Minack Theatre in Cornwall, where it ran for a week in September. Subsequently, the play was further revised to fit the time-slot in a theatre festival in Slovenia in October, where it received a standing ovation. The whole experience was beyond brilliant and the cast are now one big family, united forever by the shared memory. David will start directing *The Talented Mr Ripley* once *Ladies' Day* is finished

Liz Jardine Smith – Linda

Liz is a new member of The Questors and *Ladies' Day* is her first show here. She has previously appeared in *Paul McCartney is Dead* for the Broken Glass Theatre Company at the Camden People's Theatre and the Rag Factory; and in *Pleasance Lane* at the Pleasance Theatre (London). Other acting experience includes an open class at the Pleasance Theatre in July of this year and various school productions.
