## **Entertaining Strangers**

There was a time, over three decades ago, when the phrase "Victorian values' represented – at least to a significant part of the public – something to which we would all do well to aspire. It meant personal industry, self-reliance, moral responsibility and good husbandry. To detractors, it represented narrow mindedness, greed, lack of charity and even bigotry.

The Victorian era comprised all these things and more. During that time, Britain changed, for good and lill, beyond recognition. Clites expanded, spreading wealth and great poverty; machinery, together with an exodus towards work in the mills and factories threatened the old rural way of life. Thomas Hardy wrote, 'Only a man harrowing clods' in a slow silent walk' With an old horse that stumbles and nods' Half asleep as they stalk.' He'd been confident that '... this will go onwards the same! Though Dynasties pass' but he was wrong. Some might have sighed and locked back nostalgically to 'the good old days'; some might have locked forward to a 'brave new world'; some might have been pragmatic enough to see good and bad in both points-of-view.

During the 1980s, when Entertaining Strangers was written, I remember a parallel situation. The right wing applauded Margaret Thatcher's ethos of self-reliance and opportunity while the left criticised the notion that "there is no such thing as society". It was a decade when we saw an increasing number of new businesses, increasing wealth for some and an increasing number of people sleeping in doorways. This is why Entertaining Strangers could be said to be a play of its time but it presents these conflicts within a framework that, on another level, is just as riveting when simply seen as a thoroughly engaging story.

David Edgar wrote it at the behest of the Royal Court playwright, director and literary manager Ann Jellicoe. A small grant given to the Dorchester Community Play Association was in her gift and she had asked for a story that was pertinent to Dorset without resort to the well-used topics of Hardy or the Tolpuddle martyrs. It was to be a genuine community piece and originally had a cast of 150+ actors, drawn mostly from the dedicated amateurs with a handful of professionals in leading parts. After much research, Edgar came up with a "historically plausible but undocumented struggle" between Sarah Ediridge – the founder of Edirigge Pope (later EP), a brewery that was to last until 1996 – and the strict, teetotal parson, Henry Moule. Both these characters – and the town itself – have an epiphany in the wake of the devastating epidemic of cholera that also has resonances with the 1990s in attitudes towards AIDS. Cholera, Ilke AIDS, was an incurable disease, the causes of which were little uniderstood; both were

seen as 'God's judgement on sin' and both were brought into check by a relatively few brave and far-sighted people who, literally and metaphorically, got their hands dirty. In both cases education eventually replaced condemnation and brought hope.

In this National Theatre adaptation of the original play, we meet a large number of the characters who appeared in the original but, in our case, they are played by a company of thirteen, trebling and quadrupling roles as well as supplying narration in much the same way as was employed in Edgar's adaptation of *Nicholas Nichelay*.

The more we have examined the play, the more we have realised how expertly the themes are presented. Two overriding metaphors for the changes the characters go through are the seasons of the year and the 'mummers play'; an entertainment in which a hero – in this case Saint George – is killed and resurrected. This is the journey Sarah and Moule both take with their 'resurrection' being their growing sense of humanity in the wake of tragedy. As Sarah says, this reflects the pagan 'Green George' who died and was born again. These ancient stories celebrate the earth's journey round the sun but possibly have a deeper significance when one considers wither is just as necessary as spring.
