"Sow these seeds on the hill and you'll see... that wherever light is, no matter how weak, these flowers will find it."

It's a tall order to find "wherever light is" in losing a loved-one to a disease where its very treatment eats away at quality of life, body, mind, identity. As John Clarke does not live to give his talk on sunflowers to his wife Annie's W.I., his final message — that the ability "is such an admirable thing, and such a lesson in life" — is left for Annie, Chris and their friends to read together, and to interpret into action.

Annie knows that John would love their calendar for the obvious reasons; she also recognises the opportunity it offers to make the only kind of sense you can of the injustice of loss: using your experience to improve things for those who will face it in the future.





Scratched once too often by the settee in the visitors' room of Skipton General, the ladies of Knapeley W.I. work with hospital porter Lawrence to create an 'alternative W.I. calendar' to raise money for a new settee in memory of John. Posing nude, they aim not only beat last year's 'Views of Local Churches' sales figures, but to draw attention to the individuals behind the buns — and the flowers, teapots, roles and stages of life.


I have taken Tim Firth at his word that suggested ages are a guideline to character relationships and not a straightjacket for casting. As such, our W.I. was cast from the best auditions without age-discrimination. One particularly interesting reward was a new dynamic to Ruth's confrontation with Elaine, the beautician. By indicating less than a decade between them, the scene is freed to focus beyond the simplistic age-versus-youth aspect, SO difference between Ruth and Elaine (and the difference between Ruth before and after she meets Elaine) is one of selfworth: of ownership of your own body and image. So often seen played between an older, larger woman and younger, more-inclined-to-peroxide girl, it became about who felt beautiful. This

scene shows more than any other point in the play the truth about beauty – it was never about age, and better still it was never about Eddie.

Calendar Girls is a comedy about grief, loss, infidelity and aging. To do justice to this with all appearance of lightness takes sturdy characterisation, and respect for how big a 'reveal' it really was.

Nudity sells. But there is a difference between exploitation and celebration, and any production that rehearses Calendar Girls as if it's about women taking their clothes off will remove the difference between the W.I. calendar and page three of The Sun (and, as Firth says, have its scenes deflate like an undercooked soufflé).

At its best and most powerful, this concise, brave and beautiful script is a testament to finding life's meaning in those

who share it – friends, partners and organisations. It is also, as John tells Lawrence, a chance for a bunch of women (and men) "to get together and go nuts". I hope we have achieved this.
