




The Big Shakespeare Festival

Around spring 2010, I had a meeting with Executive Director Andrea Bath at which we discussed the Olympic Year. Discussion had been had on the subject of the Cultural Olympiad but at this stage we had no clear indication from the Mayor's Office. We had heard that the RSC may be doing something with amateur theatre companies, but again nothing firm.

Andrea said, "I think we should do something big on Shakespeare. You should lead it as you are passionate about his writing and maybe it should be three shows. What do you think?" I offered to go away and think about it.

Well I did, and in our next meeting I proposed we do three Shakespeares in repertory: Romeo and Juliet and Othello using one company of actors; and the third play should be an adaptation. Also I proposed one should be directed by me and one by a director who had never directed one of the Bard's plays. Alex Marker, head of the Questors Youth Theatre and of Design, suggested that the youth theatre should do The Tempest and that he should design a set to serve all of the shows. I offered to run workshops on verse acting and classes for as many of our acting membership who wanted them. Then Michael Langridge suggested we do the Coarse Acting Shakespeares by Michael Green as the third show.

Some people took convincing, but Chairman Richard Mead immediately stepped in to help make it happen. The Board of Trustees and the Team of Managers backed the project and we were off!

Helped by Maggie Turner, we put together a document to communicate this to our active members. Anne Gilmour, our Little Theatre Guild rep., took a copy to a meeting where Ian Wainwright of the RSC was announcing the Open Stages project. The Royal Shakespeare Company invited all of the UK's amateur companies to produce a Shakespeare work or themed play. Ian was impressed by what we proposed but said that he had already intended to come to speak to us.

RSC Artistic Director Michael Boyd had told him that he should contact The Questors. Unknown to us, Michael had grown up in Ealing and had been to The Questors to see shows. He felt we were a leading amateur company and that we should be the partner venue for the whole of the London Region, one of only ten across the UK and the only amateur partner. He believed we were a professionally organised company and that we could deal with the giant task. Again Richard Mead stepped in to organise the mammoth task of communicating with the 57 theatre companies in the London region.

Two years on, we have completed the open workshops (150 people attended) and we have trained 50 actors. Over 70 actors auditioned for the three shows. We have more Open Stages productions than any other company, seven in total. We did the first Open Stages show: The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (abridged). We have hosted two skills exchange weekends for the RSC, attended by 57 theatre companies. We are now playing three shows in repertory with the youth theatre on after that. In fact everything we set out to do, we have done.

We are part of the International Shakespeare Festival and one of the venues for the Cultural Olympiad. In April we will host the London Region Open Stages Festival. Over three weeks, 22 amateur companies will perform on our stage.

Thank you to all the members who made this happen. I am proud to be a Questor. We hope you enjoy the shows.



The Tempest: Director's Diary

I knew that agreeing to direct a Questors Youth Theatre (QYT) production would invite its challenges. I'd heard that the QYT were doing *The Tempest*, although I hadn't been involved here for four years, my previous show also being the QYT's *Arabian Nights*. I'd always admired *The Tempest*, it had always seemed an unreachable sort of play to me, and Prospero's strange relationship with Ariel and Caliban, his slaves, was fascinating. I didn't know the QYT students when starting, and experience told me that human resources on the show might be scarce — I didn't want to end up directing the play alone. That's no fun at all. When I chatted with Alice and Alex in the office here about taking the show on, I knew it would be important to have some support with me. Some of my previous A level drama students, came to mind — we'd had a lot of fun as well as some wildly creative times in the past — and so I called Louise, Alex, Sally and Lucy and said how about working on it with me. They all said yes!

There are about 500 students in the QYT. How many would come to the audition? We were told to expect between 80 and 100 and sure enough... So we had four audition days to call and recall. A huge task. We worked the students in some basic physical technique and I'd previously given them one of Caliban's speeches to learn. So 80 Caliban speeches later... The Questors Office was brilliant with the administration and by the end of the second recall we had a cast. There was a lot of interest from years 7 to 9 and we could have cast the play twice. There was also a strong male presence during auditions and I felt excited by the idea of a reasonably balanced cast; it also looked as though we weren't going to have to twist the play too much with a heavy cross-gender casting in favour of girls. Great. Casting is a mixture of luck, skill and intuition. I don't know how an actor may evolve during rehearsal unless there is prior experience, and of course it's as much about whom actors are playing opposite and a sense of the aesthetics of pairings than any individual. I was very impressed with the raw talent in the QYT and auditioning on the Playhouse stage gave everyone chance to show their awareness of audience and space. A strong cast began to emerge.

Do you know the feeling of sitting and watching a play and wishing it would just end, but you've got to wait for so and so's entrance in Act IV – two hours into the play? Or seeing young actors struggle with lines that they don't understand, haven't properly learned and who just slow the whole thing down? And the production just lurches on and on? So how could we engage the audience with this Shakespeare play potentially running two and a half hours long? All those words to deal with. I wanted to try and create two dynamic, fluent 45-minute experiences for the audience and still try and tell this fantastic yet difficult story. So I decided to heavily cut the play. I used a mixture of sources: recent film versions, the BBC animation and Steve Gooch's excellent edited Shakespeare. The compromises were many; character development and the play's beautiful poetry being the most noticeable. We hope, though, you won't be sitting waiting for it to end ©.

It takes time for any company to gel. Some know each other, some don't – it takes time to build trust and a joint sense of purpose. We worked quickly for the first four weeks, getting the bulk of the images down and very loosely blocking the play. It's

hard creative work, to create the first draft in the empty space. It's much easier when there's something to work on. We were impressed with the way many came in with lines already learned. Often young people are unable to put scripts down until the dress rehearsal, 'it'll be all right on the night' and all that, but not with this youth theatre. The edited text helped and, as I write, three weeks away from first night, many of the cast are almost word perfect.

So we are in the middle of rehearsals and the play is roughly forming. As well as some tight choreography, there are freer scenes. We open though, with a stylised storm sequence, some of which has grown out of rehearsal exercises and warmups. The notes two nights ago to the cast were 'see what you can create'. And evidence of this is emerging. Actors are creators, they are not simply the playthings of the director. Please don't ask me what you should do! Tonight some scenes just took off, young actors feeling free from scripts and from the shackles of what they are supposed to do, or simply from 'being Shakespearean'. Earlier in the week, however, Sally and I just sat there, completely drained of ideas. We can't force creativity. It comes from within us, when we're ready.

So. The Tempest. What a challenge! I hope you enjoy seeing these young people give body and voice to, what is for me, one of Shakespeare's most beautiful and magical plays.

Plot Summary

Twelve years ago, Prospero, the Duke of Milan, was usurped by his brother, Antonio, with the help of Alonso, King of Naples, and the King's brother, Sebastian. Prospero and his baby daughter Miranda were put to sea and landed on a distant island where ever since, by the use of his magic art, he has ruled over the spirit Ariel and the savage Caliban. He uses his powers to raise a storm, which shipwrecks his enemies on the island. Alonso searches for his son, Ferdinand, although fearing him to be drowned. Sebastian plots to kill Alonso and seize the crown. The drunken butler, Stephano, and the jester, Trinculo, encounter Caliban and are persuaded by him to kill Prospero so that they can rule the island. Ferdinand meets Miranda and they fall instantly in love. Prospero sets heavy tasks to test Ferdinand and, when satisfied, presents the young couple with a betrothal masque. As Prospero's plan draws to its climax, he confronts his enemies and forgives them. Prospero grants Ariel his freedom and prepares to leave the island for Milan...
