



Equus

Equus

Peter Shaffer was inspired to write *Equus* in 1973 having heard about a crime in which a 17-year-old blinded six horses in a small town in Suffolk. Intrigued as to what might drive someone to commit such an act, Shaffer created a fictional account without any knowledge of the details of the real-life crime. As such, the play tells the story of a psychiatrist who treats the young man in question and together they explore both the events that led up to the crime and the themes associated with it, including religion. The play turns into something of a detective story as the child psychiatrist (Dr Martin Dysart) has to break through the barriers put up by the boy (Alan Strang) in order to pull apart (bit by bit with the help of others in Alan's life) the events and drivers leading up to the event. Doing so, however, causes Dysart to reflect on his own life, values and sense of purpose.

The play was first presented by the National Theatre at The Old Vic on 17 July 1973 and ran until 1975. When it closed in London it moved over to Broadway to much acclaim. Some of the original cast (including Peter Firth, who played Alan for a number of years) transferred with the show, but the role of Dysart was portrayed by several famous actors including, initially, Anthony Hopkins and then finally Leonard Nimoy in 1977. The run on Broadway was particularly well-received, picking up three awards (two Tony Awards and a New York Drama Critics' Circle Award for Best Play). That production ran for a total of 1,209 performances with Marian Seldes appearing in every single one, first in the role of Hesther and later as Dora.

It was 34 years before a major revival of the play; this took place famously in 2007 starring Daniel Radcliffe as Alan and Richard Griffiths as Dysart. This production attracted much attention, chiefly because Radcliffe was only 17 years old and the role requires total nudity for part of the play. It's likely his fame for

playing Harry Potter also attracted some to see the play. Again, in a parallel with the 1970s production, this also moved over to Broadway with both Radcliffe and Griffiths continuing in role. In another pleasing parallel the show was to attract another Star Trek actor to it — this time in the form of Kate Mulgrew playing Hesther.

The play has a number of themes running through it: the most obvious of these are those of religion and religious sacrifice – these can be clearly seen in the way Alan builds his own personal theology involving the horses and the supreme ruler, 'Equus'. Sex is another prominent theme with Alan confusing his sexual feelings with the adoration of this god.

Shaffer also plays with the classic conflict of Apollo and Dionysus; here we see Alan representing the Dionysian values with Dysart taking the Apollonian side of rationality and reason. It is this conflict between the two that challenges Dysart's own values; he's considered himself a Pagan but, as he works with Alan, he begins to question whether he's simply done this in a way that society accepts rather than truly embracing it.

Putting on *Equus* now, over 40 years since it was written, presents some interesting challenges. From a context perspective, there are far more violent images in our media today than 40 years ago whether they be in news reports showing beheadings or in the almost comedic epic violence of a Tarantino film. As such, in many ways, the play's ability to shock a modern audience is somewhat diminished so care needs to be taken over how this is achieved.

This change in audience perception may well extend to particular scenes in the play; one that became very apparent during the rehearsal process is where Alan (at 6 years old) is playing on the beach some way away from his parents. A young college man on a horse sees him and takes him for a ride. In the play, Alan's parents' chief concerns relate to his safety on horseback — it's hard to imagine that would be their prime worry these days.

Biographies

Peter Collins - Set Designer

Robert has acted at The Questors since 1983, recently in *ENRON*, *Calendar Girls*, *Coarse Shakespeare – The Final Folio* and *Humble Boy* and many years ago was the front end of the horse in *On The Razzle*. He also does Front of House, occasional Grapevine bar duty and was part of the team that produced the celebration to mark the 50th anniversary event for the Judi Dench Playhouse.

Tim Hayward - Lighting Designer


