



LARKIN WITH WOMEN

Larkin with Women

Ben Brown could hardly be called a prolific playwright having written only four plays in twenty years. However, when he does, it's worth waiting for. He won the TMA New Plays Award for *Larkin with Women* and the Best New Play Award for *Three Days in May. The Promise*, which is about the Balfour Declaration promising the Jews their own homeland, was given four stars by most critics when it came out in 2011.

This play, with its somewhat suggestive title, was first performed in 1999 at the Stephen Joseph Theatre, Scarborough. Questors Vice President Oliver Ford Davies played Larkin to great acclaim. Later it transferred to The Orange Tree in Richmond. The play covers the thirty years that Larkin spent as the chief librarian of Hull University Library. Based largely on Andrew Motion's biography of one of the most famous post-war poets, the play does not follow the known facts of his life to the letter. Brown allows himself some licence in order to condense events into two hours.

We do get the lugubrious, death obsessed, jazz-loving poet, together with the three women who had relationships with him during his time at Hull. Each of the women fulfils a different need in Larkin, who was famously unfaithful to all of them. Ben Brown gives us a tender, often funny portrait of Larkin who struggled to fit his relationships around his need to write. Brown uses Yeats' lines at the front of the play script:

The intellect of man is forced to choose Perfection of the life or of the work.

Larkin was constantly torn between the need for solitude to write and his sensual need for the love and support of women. Horrified as he was at the thought of marriage, he managed to avoid it all his life despite the wishes of the women in his life, whom he often treated with casual cruelty.

Monica was the most important woman in Larkin's life. A bluestocking, she lectured in English Literature and believed passionately in his poetic genius. Betty, his secretary, worked for him for eighteen years before they started their affair. Finally Maeve, a Roman Catholic, found herself caught between her love for Larkin and her religious principles. It has been said that with the

focus of the play so strongly on Larkin, the women are somewhat in his shadow, but you must be the judge of that. The women are only seen in relation to Larkin but the actresses feel they have plenty to work on.

What Brown chooses to omit from the play is the enduring friendship between Larkin and Kingsley Amis. They met at Oxford and had much in common such as a hatred of the family, a low opinion of women and of the literature that preceded them. They exchanged letters constantly which were full of profanity and acid comments on others.

Another aspect of Brown's play is Larkin's relationship with Hull. He got the librarianship at the University but hated the city. When it was proposed that a statue of him be erected in Hull station, there was a local outcry at first. He was a posh Southerner, they said, though he was born in Coventry. The statue was eventually erected at the station in 2010 by the Larkin Society.

Nothing very much happens in the play; it is not a plot-driven piece. The characters grow older, the dynamic of the relationships shifts a little, but it is a funny and moving mood play which includes some of his beloved jazz as well as the poetry.

Working on *Larkin with Women* has been a joy. Brown uses pauses in an almost Pinteresque way and the writing is impressively precise and nuanced. It is also beautifully structured with its echoes and repetitions.
