

PYGMALION

by Bernard Shaw

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5 – 13 May 2017

Pygmalion

Pygmalion was first performed in public in 1913. Named after a Greek mythological figure, Pygmalion was a sculptor who carved a statue of a beautiful woman out of ivory. The statue was so beautiful that Pygmalion fell in love with it. This Greek romantic myth was a popular subject for Victorian English playwrights, including one of Shaw's influences, W. S. Gilbert, who wrote a successful play based on the story called Pygmalion and Galatea that was first presented in 1871. Shaw would also have been familiar with the burlesque version: Galatea, or Pygmalion Reversed.

Shaw mentioned that the character of Professor Henry Higgins was inspired by several British professors of phonetics: Alexander Melville Bell, Alexander J. Ellis, Tito Pagliardini and, above all, the cantankerous Henry Sweet.

Professor of Phonetics Henry Higgins makes a bet with Colonel Pickering that he can train Eliza Doolittle, a bedraggled Cockney flower girl, to pass as a 'duchess' at an ambassador's garden party by teaching her to assume a veneer of gentility, the most important element of which, he believes, is impeccable speech.

George Bernard Shaw, (26 July 1856-2 November 1950), known at his insistence simply as Bernard Shaw, was an Irish playwright, critic and polemicist whose influence on Western theatre, culture and politics extended from the 1880s to his death and beyond. He wrote more than sixty plays alongside Pygmalion (1913), a range incorporating both contemporary satire and historical allegory.

Shaw was the first person to be awarded both a Nobel Prize and an Academy Award, receiving the 1925 Nobel Prize for Literature and sharing the 1938 Academy Award for Best Adapted Screenplay for the film version of *Pygmalion*. Shaw's play has been adapted numerous times, most notably as the musical *My Fair Lady* and its film version.

Since Shaw's death, opinion has varied about his works. He has at times been rated as second only to William Shakespeare among English-language dramatists; analysts recognise his extensive influence on generations of playwrights.

In the final decade of his life, he made fewer public statements, but continued to write creatively until shortly before his death, aged 94, having refused all state honours, including the Order of Merit in 1946. The word 'Shavian' entered the language, encapsulating Shaw's ideas and his means of expressing them.

"Shaw was a poseur and a puritan; he was similarly a bourgeois and an antibourgeois writer, working for Hearst and posterity; his didacticism is entertaining and his pranks are purposeful; he supports socialism and is tempted by fascism." Leonard Feinberg, The Satirist (2006)

Shaw on Pygmalion vs My Fair Lady

I feel I must add this section as most people know the musical more than the play even though the play, of course, came first. And I need to add that Shaw would not have been happy about it, and I hope he forgives me for my nod to its existence.

There is no chance of a romantic future for Higgins and Eliza. Shaw had subtitled *Pygmalion* a 'romance in five acts', but only because 'the transfiguration it records seems exceedingly improbable'.

In his lifetime, Shaw had stubbornly rejected any attempt to turn *Pygmalion* into a musical. He maintained that *Pygmalion* possessed its own verbal music, but he must also have been wary of the conventions of musical comedy, which would demand a romantic union at the conclusion; the scenario that was eventually used in *My Fair Lady*.

In the musical version, Eliza returns to find Higgins in his study, disconsolately listening to her voice on his recording machine. 'If he could but let himself', the stage directions read, 'he would run to her.' Instead, he leans back and says softly, 'Eliza, where the devil are my slippers?'

This is a crowd-pleasing travesty of the original, defying the story's own internal logic. Higgins has produced a woman with a soul to call her own. Initially, he deprived Eliza of her independence as a flower seller, and in effect enslaved her. But by the end, Eliza has the power to exist without Higgins. Why should we wish her to stay with him, as his perpetual slippercarrier? Eliza, as Shaw never ceased trying to explain, would be well shot of him.

The triumphant opening on Broadway in 1956 (coming after Shaw's death in 1950) of Lerner and Loewe's *My Fair Lady* was the greatest defeat of the fulfilment of Shaw's wishes.

Biographies
