SEASON'S GREETINGS

Alan Ayckbourn was born in Hampstead in North London in 1939, and left school at the age 17. He has spent almost his entire working life in Scarborough, at the Library Theatre (now the Stephen Joseph Theatre). Beginning as an ASM, he became the Artistic Director in 1972, remaining in that post until 2009. He has written and produced more than seventy plays, all but four of which were premiered in Scarborough. More than 40 of his plays have subsequently been produced in the West End, at the Royal National Theatre or by the Royal Shakespeare Company, since his first hit, Relatively Speaking, opened at the Duke of York's Theatre in 1969. Among his plays to have been performed here at The Questors, the most recent are Improbable Fiction (2016), Absurd Person Singular (2012), House and Garden (2013) and Bedroom Farce (2008). Many of his best plays deal with the breakdown - or survival - of family life. Perhaps his own family history has played an important role in shaping his somewhat jaundiced view of domesticity. His parents (his father was an orchestral musician, his mother a writer of short stories) never married and separated shortly after the end of the War. In 1948, whilst Ayckbourn was at prep school as a boarder, his mother wrote to him to say that she was divorcing her first husband and marrying Cecil Pye, a bank manager. When he went home for the holidays, his new family consisted of his mother, his stepfather and Christopher, his stepfather's son by an earlier marriage. It does not appear to have been a particularly idyllic set-up. Ayckbourn's own marital life has been similarly unconventional. In 1957, he married Christine Roland, a fellow member of the Library Theatre Company. They had two sons, but the marriage ran into difficulties and they separated in 1971. He then set up home with another

actress, Heather Stoney, whom he had known for ten years. Despite this move, like his mother before him, he did not seek a divorce for many years, leaving it until 1997 that he and Christine finally divorced and he was able to marry Heather.

In Season's Greetings, which was first performed at Scarborough in 1980, Ayckbourn gives us the family gathering from Hell, in what is one of his finest — certainly his funniest — plays. It transferred to the Apollo in 1982, and was filmed for television with a distinguished cast, including Peter Vaughan and Geoffrey Palmer. In 2010 it was revived at the Royal National Theatre, with Catherine Tate as Belinda, Mark Gatiss as Bernard and David Troughton as Harvey.

The play was last performed at The Questors in 1998, a production memorable amongst other things, for a wonderful performance as Harvey by the late Roger Lewis. This production has been enormous fun to work on. It has been a particular joy to welcome back Keith Parry, back after a gap of 13 years, since he last appeared here as Shylock in *The Merchant of Venice*.

Biographies

James Burgess - Clive

James's productions at The Questors include *The Country Wife, Measure for Measure, Titus Andronicus, All Joy of the Worm* and The Overnight Plays. Other theatre includes: *Dido, Queen of Carthage* and *The Alchemist* (Rose Playhouse); *A Midsummer Night's Dream* (Edinburgh Fringe); *Love's Labour's Lost* (touring); *Macbeth in Pitch Black* (touring).

Julian Casey - Neville

Julian made his stage debut as Hector in *Troilus and Cressida* for Leeds University Union Theatre Group in November 1987. Since then he has appeared in over 45 productions in the North of England and London, eight of which were plays by Shakespeare. He joined The Questors in 2006 and has played a variety of roles including Dracula, lago, Petruchio and Vershinin. He played Mr Hardcastle in the Questors 2015 production of *She Stoops to Conquer* which toured to the Minack Theatre in Cornwall. He was last seen as Pompey the Tapster in *Measure for Measure* (2016).

John Dobson – Bernard

John Dobson joined The Questors in 1981 and has played everything from a French maid to a rhinoceros. Highlights include *The Faith Healer*, *Breaking the Code*, *Dublin Carol*, *Equus* and, most recently, *The Ladykillers*. He edited the Questors newsletter for many years and is now custodian of The Questors' archives.

Alison Griffin – Phyllis

Following a 15-year break from working as an actress and director, Alison began classes at The Questors in 2012. She became an acting member in 2015 and has been delighted to be able to perform again. Productions to date include *All My Sons*, *Rhinoceros*, *The Lying Kind*, Questival II and most recently another Ayckbourn, *Improbable Fiction*.

Rachel Griffiths - Belinda

Rachel joined The Questors in 2003 after graduating from Nottingham University with a degree in History and American Studies. She completed Student Group 61 in 2008 and has appeared in several productions since then, most recently in *Jumpers for Goalposts, Measure for Measure* and *Nothing Like a First Night* by Mark Hill (Eddie in *Season's Greetings*). She is also a member of The Questors' new writing team who work to discover and develop new writing talent.

Mark Hill - Eddie

Mark has acted at The Questors since 2008, including appearances in *Parlour Song* (Ned), *Dogs Barking* (Splodge/Ray), *The Flint Street Nativity* (Ass) and *Othello* (Rodorigo). He is also a writer and his self-directed production, *Nothing Like a First Night*, played to three sell-out crowds in the Studio in February 2017.

Ceri Jones - Rachel

After a 15-year break raising a family, Ceri returned to The Questors in 2017 to play the role of Mrs Eynsford-Hill in *Pygmalion*. She has taken two shows to Edinburgh, a one woman show called *D Minus* and *Hello Paris*. Her first role at The Questors was Rita in *Educating Rita*. She has been in *On the Razzle*, *Hobson's Choice* and *Benefactors*, to name but a few.

Kerri Logan – Pattie

Since joining The Questors some 15 years ago, Kerri has appeared in over a dozen Questors productions, including *Nicholas Nickleby*, *Company*, *Two*, *Misery*, *Ladies' Day*, *Hobson's Choice*, *Present Laughter*, *Blue Remembered Hills* and 2014's Christmas pantomime, *Jack and the Beanstalk*. Most recently, she appeared in *The Country Wife*, which The Questors took to the Minack Theatre in September 2017.

Keith Parry – Harvey

This is Keith's first Questors production since playing Shylock in the 2004 production of *The Merchant of Venice*. Following completion of the Questors Student Group in 1980, Keith appeared in many productions and is delighted to be back amongst friends in this wonderful theatre, working with a highly talented, creative and dedicated cast and crew.

Francis Lloyd - Director

At The Questors, Francis has directed After the Dance, French Paste, Charley's Aunt, The Importance of Being Earnest, Otherwise Engaged, Hobson's Choice, Engaged and, most recently, two plays by Brian Abbott, No Fairy Tale and Bird on the Wire. Recent acting roles include Sir Robert Morton in The Winslow Boy and Vanya in Uncle Vanya.

Stephen Souchon – Set Designer


Sylvia Wall - Costume Designer
