

Daisy Pulls It Off

DAISY PULLS IT OFF

Daisy Pulls It Off was a surprise hit, first performed at Nuffield Theatre. Southampton in 1983, and then transferring to the West End where it ran for 1.180 performances. It won the Olivier award for best new comedy, and has since been regularly revived by both amateur and professional companies. An affectionate spoof of schoolgirl novels from the early 20th century, · there is simply no other play like it - it is truly a one-off masterpiece.

The inspiration seems to be the novels of Angela Brazil (1868-1947) who wrote nearly 50 books of girls' fiction, the vast majority being boarding



The girl regarded Pen disdainfully. "I suppose," she said at length, "that you are the new servant?"

school stories. Amazingly, they were seen as disruptive and a negative influence on moral standards by some figures in authority during the height of their popularity, and in some cases were banned, or indeed burned, by headmistresses in British girls' schools.

However the basic plot of *Daisy Pulls It Off* is said to be derived from another author's work – *The Testing of Tansy* by Winifred Norling, published in 1939.

Denise Deegan, born 1952, studied stage management at East 15 Acting School, and was a freelance stage manager until the success of *Daisy Pulls It Off*, which launched her career as a writer. She has since written other plays and novels, but nothing has ever achieved the success of her debut.

This production of *Daisy Pulls It Off* is in effect a revival of our production 25 years ago, which opened on 31 December 1993, and toured to the Minack Theatre in August 1995. Having directed that production, I was unable to resist the offer to do it yet again. I am delighted to be able to recreate the original set design by Norman Barwick (sadly no longer with us); and especially grateful to Paul Clark for allowing us to reuse his original music.

Zara Hemati - Winnie Irving

Zara joined The Questors as a student in Group 72, graduating last year after playing Moth in Love's Labour's Lost and Trafalgar Gower in Trelawny of the 'Wells'. She has also worked backstage on A Little Night Music and as sound operator on The Village Bike. Elsewhere she has played Beatrice in Much Ado About Nothing and this year Sarah Jane in Voices From Violence, a play about domestic violence.

Ceri Jones - Miss Gibson

Ceri first joined The Questors in 1986 and appeared in several productions, notably as Rita in *Educating Rita*, Sheila in *Benefactors* and in *D-Minus*, a one woman show which toured to the Edinburgh Fringe. She also appeared on the Fringe in our revived production of *Hello Paris*. After a 15-year gap she returned in 2017, since when she has played Mrs Eynsford-Hill in *Pygmalion* and Rachel in *Season's Greetings*.

Nicole Kerr - Alice Fitzpatrick

Nicole joined The Questors in 2015, having previously been a member of the National Youth Theatre, and competed in multiple drama festivals. At The Questors she has appeared in *Rhinoceros*, *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, *Measure for Measure* and *Houdini and Bess* in the recent Questival. Elsewhere she has played in *The American Dream*, *The Love of the Nightingale* and *After Easter*.

Julia Marques - Clare Beaumont

Julia joined The Questors a year ago and her first performance here was as Smorg in *Mother Goose*, for which she was so heavily made up you will not recognise her. Previously she was a member of a theatre society in Kenya, where she played in *The Importance of Being Earnest*, *Steel Magnolias*, *Stepping Out* and several pantos. Julia recently graduated with an MA in Climate Change and is now working in the environmental sector. She tells us, ironically, that she didn't enjoy hockey at school!

Tristan Marshall - Mr Thompson

Tristan joined The Questors in 2003, since when he has acted and directed. His recent appearances were as Horner in *The Country Wife* and Subtle in *The Alchemist*, while recent productions have been Webster's *The Duchess of Malfi* and Lucy Kirkwood's *NSFW*. Tristan is also a member of the Acting Auditions panel and the organiser of the Overnight Plays. Outside The Questors, he is a lecturer at Shakespeare's Globe and tells us "I've never lost my memory at sea – at least I don't think I have".

Anne Neville - Miss Granville

Anne trained at Drama Centre and joined The Questors in 1981, since when she has acted in and directed more plays than it is possible to mention. Her most recent acting appearances were in *The Country Wife*, *Burnt by the Sun*, *A Little Night Music* and *The Crucible*. Her latest productions have been *The Cripple of Inishmaan*, *Larkin with Women* and *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. Anne is currently The Questors' Artistic Director, and has previously been a member of AD teams — she can take the credit for being the person who originally suggested that we should do *Daisy Pulls It Off* in 1993.

Lindsay Pattison - Dora Johnston

Lindsay began as a singer before discovering her love of acting. She fronted and managed the alternative rock band Tuff-Titti Ritzi in Glasgow and was a member of Aberdeen's all-female *a capella* group The Killer Quines, with whom she reached the finals of the UK Voice Festival in 2016. She was an actor and workshop leader with Centre Stage Theatre Company in Aberdeen. Lindsay joined The Questors in November 2017, and this is her first appearance here.

Graham Reid - Pianist and Musical Director

Graham has a degree in Music from Edinburgh University, and joined The Questors in 2015. Since then he has been involved musically in five productions: *Red Peppers* as MD and pianist; *The Country Wife* as MD, composer, arranger and keyboard player; *Love's Labour's Lost* as MD, composer and keyboard player; *Lady Susan* as MD, composer, arranger and keyboard player; and most recently *Animal Farm* as MD and pianist.

Phillip Sheahan - Mr Scoblowski

Phillip has been an acting member of The Questors since 1974, since when he has participated in over 80 Questors productions, as an actor, director and playwright. His most recent appearances have been in Stephan Berkoff's *Greek* and Molière's *The Miser*. He has been a contributor to The Questors' Reminiscence Project PlayBack, as a writer and actor, most notably as the author of the hugely successful *Soapsud Island*. Phillip is delighted to be reviving his role as Mr Scoblowski from 1993

Severine Simone - Belinda Mathieson

Severine joined The Questors in January this year and this is her first production here. She trained at the Cape Academy of Performing Arts in South Africa, and has worked in stage, theatre, film, commercial & corporate and immersive art platforms as a dancer, actress and performer. She is a dance and drama tutor with the Royal Academy of Dance and tutors and devises theatre for the Baked Bean Company. She is also a tutor for Questors Youth Theatre.

Charlotte Sparey - Trixie Martin

Charlotte trained for three years at Arts Educational School (ArtsEd), gaining a BA in acting for film and television. She joined The Questors in 2016 and was immediately cast as Alithea in *The Country Wife*, which also went to the Minack Theatre last summer. *Daisy Pulls It Off* is her second Questors production. Charlotte is also a professional voice-over artist.

Annabel Spinks-Jones – Mother/Mademoiselle

Annabel joined The Questors as a member of Acting for All in 2014, moved on to Encore the next year and became an acting member in 2015. Since then she has appeared in the Overnight Plays in 2016 and 2017, the Coarse Acting festival in 2017, and played Fairy Bowbells in *Dick Whittington & His Cat*, our Christmas 2015 pantomime. Elsewhere she has appeared in two indie feature films and several other short films and radio plays, and directed her first short film in 2017.

Charlotte Thompson - Daisy Meredith

Charlotte joined The Questors in January this year, so this is her first production. Previously she trained on the BA Acting course at the London College of Music (University of West London), playing Tanya in *Punk Rock*, Monk in *Canterbury Tales* and Elvira in *Blithe Spirit*. Elsewhere she has played Marina in *Pericles*, for Southsea Shakespeare Actors.

Georgie Turner - Sybil Burlington

Georgie joined The Questors in February this year, and immediately got involved in this year's Overnight Plays. She is a member of the National Youth Theatre and has acted before at The Rose Theatre in Kingston, Theatre by the Lake in Keswick and the York Theatre Royal.

Lisa Varty - Monica Smithers

After an MA in Theatre Studies at the University of Glasgow, Lisa joined Questors Student Group 66, graduating with performances in *Trojan Barbie* and *On the Razzle*. As an acting member, she has since played in *House and Garden*, *Be My Baby*, *Futures*, *Uncle Vanya* and this season's *Sleepers in the Field*. Elsewhere she has acted in *Hedda Gabler* (Upstairs at the Gatehouse) and *Galatea* (White Bear).

David Emmet - Director

David trained as an actor in Student Group 28, but has directed more often than he has acted at The Questors. *Daisy Pulls It Off* is his 57th production, not counting assistant directorships and fringe shows. Other recent outings as a director were *Scarborough*, *Don't Dress for Dinner*, *The Wonderful World of Dissocia*, *The Pride*, *Mary Stuart* (which he also translated), *Night of the Soul* and *Titus Andronicus*. David is also Director of Studies for the Student Group and teaches acting in the Foundation Year. He is also the Company Secretary, Casting Adviser, head of the Stage Management department and works in the Box Office. He has in the past been Artistic Director and Chairman of The Questors. David is delighted to have the chance once again to direct *Daisy Pulls It Off*.

Jenny Richardson - Costume Designer

After many years working in stage management, props and set design, Jenny enjoyed a change of direction to costume design, recently for *Equus*, *All My Sons*, *The Lying Kind*, *The Cripple of Inishmaan*, *Don't Dress for Dinner, Measure for Measure*, *Scarborough*, *Sweet Charity*, *Larkin with Women* and *Mojo*. Jenny can also be found working in Box Office, and is frequently in demand as an upholsterer.

John Green - Lighting Designer

John has had a lifelong interest in the use of light to sculpt a space, set a mood and direct the eye, but only got involved in stage lighting comparatively recently. In his seven years as a member of The Questors he has been involved with the lighting of numerous shows. Previous shows as Lighting Designer include *Dead White Males*, *Emil and the Detectives*, *Trelawny of the 'Wells'* and *Animal Farm*.
