Getting the most from your membership



Fields at The Questors serves Italian coffee, fine teas, hearty meals and handmade cakes, and is the perfect spot for a pre-theatre meal or



ARIADNE & THE MONSTERS

Welcome to our movement-based adaptation of the Greek myth *Theseus & the Minotaur*. I first started thinking about *Ariadne & the Monsters* in 2015, inspired by Anaïs Mitchell's *Hadestown* (the excellent concept album from 2010, not the recent stage adaptation). I wrote some songs to be recorded, but decided it might be better performed live – maybe it could be a ballet? But then it might need a plot summary which was – and continues to be – a huge no-no for me. I attempted writing a script. Much of it was not very good and anyway the whole idea was too ambitious, and the plot timeline was a bit fuzzy, and it was all quite daunting... so I got on with other things, secretly hoping I'd find the means (read: courage) to produce it somehow, someday, somewhere.

Lucky me, four years later Alex Marker required something a bit weird and different in the Studio! Luckier still, my friends Tim and Rory were convinced by my vague ramblings about this bizarre story with which I was still so fascinated. Tim sorted the timeline issues and made all the words sound beautiful and clever; Rory added his limitless imagination and experience from across various departments to the mix (and made a few good puns); both have been an absolute dream to work with. Our brilliant cast and production team have worked tirelessly over the last few months and their enthusiasm for contributing creative and crazy ideas has not wavered from day one. I cannot really claim to have directed this at all as it has been an extraordinary group effort and I am so proud of every person involved, and excited to finally share the product of this very special collaboration.

Additionally, I would like to thank Ethan Verrall for providing a wealth of invaluable research and Hazel Maclean for initial design ideas in the early days of the project. Thanks also to Heather Mungin and Cassiah Joski-Jethi for proof-reading and constructive criticism; a special thanks to my family Simon, Beata and Leyla Page for always encouraging my artistic endeavours; and of course to Josh Lewis for his constant support.

P.S. Please don't ask me how I came up with the music. I get this question all the time and it's impossible to answer. If you do, I will say something annoyingly brief and unhelpful like 'it came to me in a dream'.

THE DOG & THE SCARF

It's wonderful that Sara and I have had the chance to present our two shows as part of the season in the Studio. Something different. Physical devised theatre. I've been doing this sort of stuff for years, but usually as an extra event, or as a late-night show, and not many people see those.

I've had the idea for a story about a dog for years, ever since I saw a photograph in a paper of a dog, somewhere in Russia, carrying a briefcase in its mouth, shopping for its owner. You immediately felt compassion for the dog, and wanted to know more about it.

Another inspiration was the Russian film, *Ballad of a Soldier*, where a soldier travels across Russia to see his mother, and ends up only having a few minutes with her before returning to the battlefield.

I've long wanted to work with puppets and knew Shaan had great skill in this area, so he was the first person I approached about the concept. It was he who suggested using shadow puppetry for some of the effects I wanted.

Although the idea for the story is mine, half of what you see on stage came from the cast, ideas that came up during discussions and arguments about what was and wasn't working in a scene. For instance, the very first scene bears little resemblance to my original idea, having evolved organically during rehearsals from improvisations among the cast. In fact, there was never a script, just pictures in my head, and the cast worked out how to link the pictures into a (hopefully) coherent story.

I chose the music, and scenes were always timed to fit the tone and tempo of the music. We had to find different pieces of music whenever a scene developed in a new way.

Biographies

David has been a member for yonks and began a mini-company (with John Dobson) called Crucial Image, creating devised theatre. Acting credits include, most recently, Rabbit Hole, Absent Friends and Nell Gwynn. Emily Sanctuary – Actor (The Dog)


