Getting the most from your membership



Whipping It Up

by Steve Thompson

WHIPPING IT UP

It's a particular pleasure for The Questors to be performing *Whipping It Up*, as its author, Steve Thompson, is one of that select band of Questors actors who have gone on to become successful playwrights. Steve appeared in our productions of *Godspell* (1997), *Three Sisters* (1997) and *Arcadia* (1998), before going off to develop his writing career.

Originally a maths teacher, he gave up that career in 2000 to become a full time dad and house husband, because (he says) his wife (a successful barrister) was earning much more money than him. But that gave him the chance to write, and after training on the playwrights' course at RADA, he had a breakthrough success with *Damages* at the Bush Theatre in 2004.

This was quickly followed in 2006 by Whipping It Up, also at the Bush, which went on to play in the West End in 2007. Subsequently he had success with Roaring Trade (Soho 2009) and No Naughty Bits (Hampstead 2011). I missed the original production of Roaring Trade, but caught its revival at the Park Theatre in 2015, so I'm pleased to say I saw all of Steve's major stage work. He has combined his stage writing with success as a screenwriter, writing episodes of Doctor Who and Sherlock among many others. We welcome him back to The Questors.

As we rehearsed *Whipping It Up*, we were thrilled to discover how topical it was becoming, with stories in the news about allegedly outrageous behaviour by government whips, a weak prime minister facing a possible leadership challenge, misbehaviour by MPs and general political skulduggery. But Steve's play was very thoroughly researched.

In the published text he acknowledges the help he received from several politicians, journalists, and indeed those within the Whips' Office who were willing to divulge its secrets without being named. Reviews from the original production tell us that it was seen by a considerable number of MPs, none of whom complained about inaccuracies in the goings on — slightly exaggerated, perhaps, with a little dramatic licence, but fundamentally true.

We would like to add our own acknowledgements to James Murray, currently Labour MP for Ealing North, and his immediate predecessor Steve Pound, who also served time as an opposition whip. Both were able to confirm many of the details in the play, as well as sharing some interesting stories of their own.

When written in 2006, Whipping It Up was set in a hypothetical future, imagining that after 12 years of Labour government, a new Conservative administration under David Cameron was now in power, with an overall majority of only three. We know that didn't quite come to pass as predicted, so we felt it was inappropriate now to set the play in 2006. Rather we have taken the step of inviting the audience into a wholly imaginary present day. Let us pretend that at some unspecified date we are six months into a new Tory government under Boris Johnson (the references fit him to a tee).

The Whips' Office

Each main party (government and official opposition) has a Whips' Office. The whips are, in effect, the business managers of proceedings in the House of Commons and HR managers of MPs. It is their job to agree the timings of debates, get their MPs to turn up to vote, and arrange pairs for MPs who are unable to attend. They communicate through the "usual channels", meaning that the Chief or Deputy Chief Whip of each party maintains regular communication with their opposite number: their offices are on opposite sides of the main lobby, a quick and useful channel.

Government Whips in particular have the responsibility to ensure that legislation is passed and to persuade recalcitrant MPs to vote with the government. This is the process known as "whipping in" – a hunting term which refers to keeping stray hounds in the body of the pack.

They can do this both by carrot and stick. Not only can they twist arms and put names into a black book, they can also offer positions in government and select committees.

The Whips' Office is headed by the Chief Whip, which is an official constitutional post (the Parliamentary Secretary to the Treasury). The Deputy Chief also has an official role. Below them are any number of junior whips, each of whom is responsible for maintaining contact with, and whipping in a number of specified backbenchers on their "card". (In the play we are told there are 16 Whips, and 320 Tory MPs, so allowing for ministers and junior ministers, that would mean they might have around 15 each.)

There is always a whip on the government front bench throughout all sittings of the House. They have a designated seat, and they sit according to a rota. There is indeed an emergency bell under the seat (though these days they are more likely to use their phones), which is essential as they are not allowed to speak. They will control proceedings through the use of silent signals, just as Alastair is described as doing in the play.

Glossary

Bill. A draft piece of legislation. The passage of a bill through the House of Commons will involve a debate and then a vote by MPs.

Amendment. A proposal to change the wording of a bill. Each amendment may require a separate vote.

Division. A vote in the House of Commons. A bell sounds and the MPs literally divide and pass through two lobbies where they are counted and their votes recorded.

Pairing. An arrangement between two MPs on opposite sides of the House not to vote on a particular occasion so that their absences cancel each other out. Pairs are often arranged by the Whips' Office.

Three-line Whip. Every MP is given a weekly schedule of business, stating when they are expected to turn up to vote. The importance of each item of business is reflected in the number of times it is underlined, which is decided by the whips. A three-line whip indicates an unbreakable commitment.

Biographies

Claudia Carroll - Maggie

Claudia started in the student group (Group 65) and has since acted in many Questors productions over more than a decade, including *The Duchess of Malfi*, *She Stoops to Conquer*, *The Master Builder*, *Burnt by the Sun* and *The Country Wife*. She was last seen as Kate Middleton in *King Charles III*. She supports the Grapevine by always drinking the prosecco, teaches in the Youth Theatre and has volunteered in many, many other areas of the theatre.

Julian Casey - Alastair

Julian joined The Questors in 2006, having previously acted with Leeds University Union Theatre Group, Billingham Theatre Upstairs, Bums on Seats Theatre Company and Middlesbrough Little Theatre. At The Questors he has played in Comedians, Two, The Taming of the Shrew, Three Sisters, The Winterling, Othello, She Stoops to Conquer, Measure for Measure, Season's Greetings, The Bear, Rutherford and Son and Days of Significance. He is delighted to be acting again after the pandemic-enforced break.

James Connor - Sound Designer

After over 30 years working across operational, commercial and project management disciplines in the finance and insurance sectors, James is currently business manager for Brent Music Service in NW London (part of Brent Council). Angus Duke - Set Designer

Angus has been a member of The Questors since 2012, responsible for various roles backstage and occasionally on stage (Dave in *Stags and Hens*, Charles in *Trelawny of the 'Wells'*, Ensemble in *George Orwell's1984*). In 2017 he attended the University of West London to study Theatre Management and Design with a speciality in set design. This is his second production as set designer after *Future Conditional*.

David Emmet - Director

David trained as an actor in Student Group 28, but is now known more as a director; Whipping It Up is his 60th main production. Other recent productions include Things I Know to be True, Nell Gwynn, Daisy Pulls It Off, Don't Dress for Dinner, The Wonderful World of Dissocia, The Pride and Mary Stuart. David is also Director of Studies for the Student Group and teaches acting in the Foundation Year. Anne Gilmour - Costume Designer


Simon Taylor - Fulton
